
During the break, we were all surprised with a colorful and action-packed accordion and juggling show put on by new member **Skyler Fell** and her juggling friend **Melody Guzman**. We will be hearing/seeing them again!

Next up was the legendary Carl Fortina who put on a really impressive show, both with the old Cellini accordion

recently restored by **Vince Cirelli**, and with his "regular" accordion. First he demonstrated the old Cellini, which has a piano keyboard on the base

cordion. First he demonstrated the old Cellini, which has a piano keyboard on the bass side. Carl must have done a lot of practicing, he played such amazing melodies on the bass side! On the Cellini he played Makin' Whoopie, Sophisticated Lady/Don't Get Around Much Anymore/Satin Doll (medley), and an Ellington medley. Applause was warm and enthusiastic, both for Carl and for Vince Cirelli, the craftsman who so lovingly restored the old Cellini. Carl told the now-familiar story of how he acquired that old accordion: it had belonged to Jascha Heifetz who willed it to Carl. The

two had met about 40 years ago and became close friends. The accordion had been made specially for Jascha Heiftez when Heifetz had indicated to Cellini that he couldn't play "those adding machine keys," and hence the piano keyboard on bass side. Carl then continued (on the Cellini) with two Bossa Novas, Wave and Girl from Ipanema. He also spoke of the limitations of this accordion, such as: it has only 12 pleats in the bellows, you can't use your thumb on the lefthand piano keyboard, and the treble keys are narrower than those of modern accordions,

forcing him to adjust his thinking when playing this keyboard. Carl continued with *All the Things You Are, Rainy Day, Body & Soul.* The Cellini accordion has 2 and 3 reeds and was built around 1934. Then

he played the Godfather theme while standing and turning so everyone could see the entire accordion. Steve Cannata commented that he remembers hearing Carl play Bumble Boogie at age 16 at the Italian-American Club.

Carl told many,
many great anecdotes. He especially
loves playing in an orches-

tra, surrounded by strings. After playing *Lover*, Carl switched to his "regular" accordion and was joined by Harry Gay on the stage. Harry told of how he met Carl (see the March SFAC newsletter). Carl was 19 at the time and Harry was in total awe of Carl's playing. Harry wore out the grooves on a 78 rpm record made in 1949 of Carl playing with Dino Bennetti. If I understood correctly, the pieces on that 78 rpm were *Rosalee Polka* and a beautiful waltz, *Quando Era Piccolina*.

Harry and Carl played several tunes together, including Tic-Toc

Polka; Harry's favorite and signature piece, a collection of Bavarian tunes (though Harry learned it in Switzerland), Iupali, Iupali. Carl very cleverly tossed Carnival of Venice into the Iupali song!

Harry then turned his place on stage over to **Peter Di Bono.** Peter and Carl played some beautiful duets, including La Spagnola, O Marie/Ciribiribin (medley), Granada, both grandiose and tender; some tunes from My Fair

Lady: On The Street Where You Live, I've Grown Accustomed to Her Face, and I Could Have Danced All Night. Then they played Flight of the Angels and O Masolino dei Fiori (thanks to Steve Cannata who supplied me with some of those Italian names!).

"Dear Valerie,


I recently joined your club and attended my first meeting today. What a program! What performers! Amazing is all I can say! I was deeply impressed.



#### Very Sad News . . .




Ed Zaro



## **Accordionist Gets Global Play**


"The Fox and the Hound," a composition by accordionist Frank Mucedola, a life member of Local 78 (Syracuse, NY), was recently performed by the Moravian Philharmonic Orchestra in Olomouc, Czech Republic, and the Auckland Symphony Orchestra in Takapuna, New Zealand. This is not the first time Mucedola's accordion music has been heard beyond these shores. As a member of the Mantovani Orchestra he has toured Canada, Japan, South Korea, Taiwan, Singapore, Malaysia, and China.

Written originally for solo accordion, "The Fox and the Hound," a portrait in sound, was published by Pietro Deiro Publications in 1968. It has been used as teaching material for advanced accordion students and performed in concerts in the US and abroad. In 1969 the American Accordionists' Association selected this composition as a required test piece, to be played in their national contest for all entries in the advanced category.

Due to the composition's popularity Mucedola decided to do an orchestral arrangement of the piece. In 1991, Mucedola had experienced copyist and arranger Tom Ginsberg of Baltimore, Maryland, write a version that complimented the accordion solo arrangement. 
