

President's Message

One hundred forty-six thousand dollars! Thanks to YOU, that's the amount that KQED raised on Dec. 4th, the evening that BAACers took over the pledge phones at our local public TV station. And that money was from the people who were able to get through on the phones! Towards the end of the evening, we were ll taking pledges from people who said they had been on hold for half an hour. Consider 14,000 pledges that evening, averaging \$100 each. Then add in the potential pledgees who couldn't get through. And, multiply that by, let's see, perhaps 100 - 500 representing the number of people watching who did NOT call in to pledge. That's a lot of people who watched folks wearing Bay Area Accordion Club shirts answer phones. And who watched Richard Yaus, Ron Borelli, and Mike Zampiceni ably play 30-second spots in front of the cameras for each of the six breaks!

It was a fantastic opportunity for us, and YOU made the most of it. We promoted the Bay Area Accordion Club, we made a strong statement to the general public about the appeal of accordions, we raised a huge amount for KQED, we worked our tails off in the process, and we had a marvelous time doing it.

I can't recall when I've heard so many rave reviews. Three people from KQED phoned me the following day to thank us and tell us how appreciative they were of what we had done in such a short time. Average weekday pledges, they said, total about \$50,000. And lots of participants have told me what a great time they had, how the evening drew all of us together in a very positive way, and how tired they were when they got home!

It all happened very quickly. Two weeks previously BAAC member Dick Schiller, who works at KQED, told me the group of 65 they had lined up for that evening had canceled, and would BAAC perhaps consider

Peter Soave Workshop/Demo on Accordion Technique

The finest accordionist in the US and probably the greatest in the world, will be in town on Feb. 2nd and 3rd, so we decided to ask him to share a few of his secrets with us. Peter Soave has agreed to conduct a workshop/demonstration on Tuesday evening, February 3rd, from 6:15 until 8:00.PM.

The general subject, Peter says, is "All Aspects of Finer Accordion Playing." Topics will be applicable and relevant to all ability levels. He plans to demonstrate and discuss:

- ♦ various keyboard touches and their differentiation (articulation), which can be used in all styles of music, but which are often underutilized by accordionists.
- sound production and how to optimize bellows action.
- presenting a better accordion image; playing and representing the accordion in good taste.

Peter asks that you bring both your accordion and any questions that you have about difficulties or challenges you have encountered in your playing.

The workshop will be held in San Francisco, location to be announced in the January newsletter. Workshop fee is \$20. Accordion to Boaz

Beginning with this issue, Accordion to Boaz will be a regular feature of the BAAC newsletter. This column is intended to help you keep your instruments in top condition, looking and sounding first-rate. Accordion answer man Boaz Rubin is a professional repairman based in Oakland.

Frequently Asked Accordion Questions

Q: I have some sticky bass buttons - can I use a lubricant to free them up?

A: Sticky bass buttons are usually the result of binding parts within the bass machine, and require mechanical repairs. Lubrication is NOT the answer. While it may temporarily free up the sticky buttons, in the long term lubrication tends to make the problem worse. Oily lubricants attract dust and dirt; dry lubricants such as graphite work their way into the reeds. Either way, you'll gum up the works and that will require a costly dismantling and thorough cleaning of the bass machine, in addition to the mechanical repairs you should have gotten in the first place to free the sticky buttons.

Q: I have a reed that sounds in the out direction but not the in (or vice versa). What is causing this?

A: Most of the time a reed that doesn't sound is stuck on a piece of dirt that has invaded your accordion. This is one reason why it is important to keep your accordion clean. An experienced repairperson can easily remedy this problem. Another common reason for a reed to refuse to sound is a broken reed tongue. A broken reed tongue can often be identified by listening for a rush of air past the reed tongue when you attempt to make it sound. To keep your accordion clean but breathing, wipe it down with a soft cloth after each use and store it out of the case with a cloth laid over the grill.

Q: My accordion is dry (or wet) tuned and I would like it to have more (or less) of a musette, can this be done?

A: If the accordion hasn't been tuned too many times it is possible to repitch the reeds to change the musette. However, every time a reed is tuned, some metal is removed from that reed. When a reed is repitched, even more metal may have to be removed. If too much metal is taken off, the reedmay weaken and lose its ability to hold a pitch. Generally, good quality accordion reeds can be safely repitched once in their lifetime but the opinion of an expert should be sought first.

February General Meeting Featuring Exciting French Performer ean-Louis Noton

Plan to attend our February meeting on Monday the second, because you won't want to miss our very special guest for the evening, French accordionist/entertainer Jean-Louis Noton. Let us introduce you to a very unusual performer! Some call Jean-Louis the Evel Knievel of the accordion. Don't expect any motorcycles; nor will he leap from our stage. (He did, however, celebrate his 45th birthday last year by climbing, with his accordion, Switzerland's Dente Blanche (White Tooth), and playing it at the top! In so doing he set a Guiness World Record taking 3 days to do so.

Jean-Louis has been playing the accordion since age nine, and studied for five years at the conservatory of Lyon, France. He has received the O.R.T.F. Pinder trophy in Paris and the Cup of the President of the French Republic. He has been the demonstrator and MIDI consultant for Cavagnolo accordions since 1991, and has traveled the world in that capacity.

He will be presented by Peter Soave, who will travel here with Jean-Louis. Since Jean-Louis' English is limited, Peter will introduce his numbers and will talk about the action on which Jean-Louis will perform his beautiful French music. The Odyssey, developed by Cavagnolo Accordions, is an electronic instrument with more than one hundred accordion sounds, with expression controlled by the bellows. It is reedless and therefore very lightweight. Many call it the "Accordion of the Future". It is being very successfully marketed and sold mainly in Europe; for most of us, this will be our first chance to see and hear one.
