BAAC's March meeting will take place at the new home of the Bay Area Accordion Club at Patio Espanol, 2850 Alemany Blvd., In San Francisco near Daly City.

Driving Directions:

From the Peninsula via 280 North: Take

280 North to Daly City. Stay left on freeway and merge onto Junipero Serra Blvd. Highway 1.(280 veers off to the right). Go approximately mile and turn right onto Alemany Blvd., and follow it past San Jose Ave.(under the freeway), Sickles, Laura, Lawrence, and turn left at Farragut directly into the Patio Espanol parking lot.

From the Peninsula via 101 North: Drive north of 3 Com Park and take the 280 Daly City overpass which veers to the left. Drive south on 280 to one turnoff past Geneva Ave. which will say Mission Street-Daly City 82-1. You will come off the freeway onto San Jose Ave. Stay



in left lane to take an immediate left onto Sickles Ave., and another immediate left onto Alemany Blvd. Then it's Laura, Lawrence, and turn left at Farragut directly into the Patio Espanol parking lot.

From the Bay Bridge: Take 101 South staying in the right lanes so you can take the Daly City 280 South exit. Drive south on 280 to one turnoff past Geneva Ave. which will say Mission Street-Daly City 82-1. You will come off the freeway onto San Jose Ave. Stay in left lane to take an immediate left onto Sickles Ave., and another immediate left onto Alemany Blvd. Then it's Laura, Lawrence, and turn left at Farragut

directly into the Patio Espanol parking lot.

From the Golden Gate Bridge: After the bridge, turn onto Park Presidio Blvd which becomes 19th Ave. after the Park. Follow 19th Ave. all the way past the Stonestown

Shopping Center and S.F. StateUniversity,, bending around to the left (get into right lane) to where it meets Junipero Serra Blvd. Turn right onto Junipero Serra and go approximately mile taking the 2nd right turn at Alemany Blvd. East/ Cow Palace which loops around onto Brotherhood Way. Traveling east for mile take a left onto Alemany Blvd. Follow it past San Jose Ave.(under the freeway), Sickles, Laura, Lawrence, and turn left at Farragut directly into the Patio Espanol parking lot.

PIETRO DEIRO ACCORDION

The restoration process is proceeding rapidly on Pietro Deiro's 1917 accordion by master builder Vince Cirelli of San Francisco.

The accordion being restored was bought from Guerrini (dated June 6, 1917) in San Francisco.

A bit of incorrect accordion lore is that Pietro had a crooked 3rd and 4th fingers. To accommodate this his keyboard was supposedly cut differently than the standard of the day. Actually this is not correct. His fingers were perfectly normal., but his accordion keys were cut out slightly near the E,

F, B, and C keys. This was done not to allow for crooked fingers but instead to allow him for instance, to depress an F while his fingers were located between the black keys. This modification allowed him to do arpeggios in that position more effec-

> tively. Prior to Pietro, the keyboards had much shorter keys and were narrower. The modifications he developed have seen their way onto all modern piano accordion keyboards. Thanks to Pietro your modern accordion is a better playing instrument,



CLEAN SWEEP for FRANCE at COUPE MONDIALE

The 52nd Coupe Mondiale International Competition for Accordion Soloists was held from November 3rd to 7th in Trossingen, Germany with contestants from France winning each of the competition categories. Jerome Richard student of Frederic Deschamps, was crowned the 1999 C.I.A. World Accordion Champion, after an exciting competition, which saw Dragan Vasilievic (Yugoslavia) in second place.

This was the first time in many years that an American entered this prestigious competition. Cathy Sommers, daughter of Joan Cochran Summers, who heads the US's only college-level accordion program in Kansas, practiced for months and did herself proud, placing 7th. Cathy reports that the competition is really tough, as many of the European entrants cut their competition teeth at a very young age and then go to several competitions annually right through young adulthood.

So, congratulations, Cathy!

MULTISENSORY LEARNING AND YOUR ACCORDION (cont.)

FEELINGS (Emotions)

Experience the "feeling" the music is intended to express that you are playing. Experience the "feelings" that you yourself have come up with...whatever they happen to be. Experiment with Love, Anger, Excitement, Peace, Happiness, and Sadness....as you play.

Where in your body do you feel the higher pitches and the lower vibrations? Usually, the higher vibrations are felt in the head and the middle and low vibrations are felt in the throat, chest and stomach. (this is not true for everyone). The way we feel as we practice or perform is as important as having clear performance goals. "As we practice so we perform." Make having fun a goal to be experienced. Other goals to experience are: relaxation, comfort,, being focused and staying focused, being concentrated. "Lose" yourself in the experience of playing your accordion. BECOME the music.

If your life is precious to you, you will want your practice time to be both enjoyable and musically rewarding. Life like Music contains its times of discord and tension and its moments of relaxation and repose. Practice involves discipline & repetition but also includes: experimentation, creativity, playing for fun, exploration, and delight. If you are tired, play the music in a "tired" manner and thus you are being true to how you are feeling right now. Once you get started, you'll find yourself in the mood for a productive practice.

MENTAL & PHYSICAL

Mastery of the keyboard utilizes your auditory skills (melodic & harmonic memory), technical skills (dexterity & muscle memory), theoretical skills (knowledge of chord forms-the form and analysis of the notes in each key, and interval relationships, knowing where you are at all times), practice techniques (do not lift your fingers off the keyboard until you know exactly where you are going, how far, how fast, what dynamics, etc.) "Slow enough to think of what you are changing TO and what you are changing FROM." Daniel Abrams, pianist-educator.

GOOD TONE AND RELAXED HANDS

EXPERIMENT playing it too soft, too loud, the way it feels most comfortable, too fast, too slow, with strong rhythmic emphasis, romantically, sadly, formally, as a carefree spirit, aggressively, gingerly, religiously (like a hymn), in an improvised manner, as you would rearrange it. Swaying, dancing, singing, foot tapping, conducting.
