President's Message

We need to make a decision about the location of our annual picnic site at this time. Your Executive Board will be discussing the matter at our next meeting on February 1st and we hope to bring our recommendation to the membership at the February general meeting on Monday, February 6th.

As you may know, the Palo Alto Elks' Club has raised the rental fee for their picnic grounds from \$1000 to \$1500. This means for us that, if we charge \$5/person admission, we will lose money on the picnic without 325 paid admissions (since we have other picnic-associated expenses). Even if we decide to charge more per person, it is clear that the picnic will no longer have the potential of being a fund raiser for BAAC and may well show a loss.

We are considering changing our location to the Swiss Park in Newark. The rent is only \$400 and it has other attractive features. Several of us have visited Swiss Park recently and we will share with you at the February meeting what we have learned.

At this point the decision will simply be whether the picnic location will be Palo Alto Elks' or the Swiss Park in Newark. If you have an alternate suggestion which you wish to propose on February 6th, please research it first and be prepared to provide at that meeting specific information concerning cost, parking, availability, picnic tables, barbecue pits, shade, stage, electricity, restroom facilities, playground, and chairs. We will not be able to entertain other suggestions made without these specifics.

In addition to this decision, we need to recruit a committee to work on such things as a raffle, door prizes, program, and other such non-details. See you on Monday, Feb. 6th.

January Board Meeting

Synopsis

The meeting agenda was read and approved as were the Minutes of the December Board Meeting.

- The Treasurer reported \$3,567.75 in checking and \$3,892.88 in savings, of which \$1,272.97 is for the Performance Fund.
- The Board established April 1st as the deadline for entries in the Logo Contest.
- We will contact Myron Floren in March to pursue specific dates for the Floren Concert. Frank Schlotter, Grant Groberg, Bob Berta and Denny Huff will assist with concert organization. (Editor's note. Volunteers welcome especially if you have any good ideas on promotion.)
- The Veikko Concert will be at Mercy High School on 5 March. Cost is \$10 per person.
- Joe Smiell will check out the suitability of Swiss Park for the BAAC picnic.
- The Board discussed sending exchange players to the Seattle Club this Spring.
- Anchorage Shopping Center apparently did mail check for the Strollers at the Festival, but it isn't clear where it was sent. The Board will investigate.
- The idea of an "Accordion Show Case" was moved to 1996 due to the activities already planned for this year. In a related discussion, Joe Smiell volunteered to do a Button Box Presentation/Discussion for the Folk Music Society's Annual Show.
- AFNA, the Accordion Federation of North America, has extended BAAC an invitation to its 40th Anniversary Celebration in Los Angeles, 16-21 August.
- The Board will select a Nominating Committee in April in anticipation of the next BAAC elections to be held in June.

Accordion Festival

Houston, TX 7-12 July 1995

The American Accordionists' Association has selected Houston, Texas to host its 1995 Accordion Festival. The Festival will run from the 7th to the 12th of July and will feature a testimonial dinner honoring accordion great, Bill Palmer, with a special tribute to the memory of his colleague, partner and friend of 40 years, Bill Hughes. The famous duo of Palmer-Hughes created the world's most successful and complete accordion ourse. Their course guided generaons of accordion students since 1952, while enjoying sales exceeding 10 million copies. These two men represent a lifetime of accordion achievements which ran a parallel course with accordion history. Together, they perfected and extended the perimeters of concert accordion work well beyond the limits of their day.

The Festival will feature the Saturday, July 8 testimonial dinner, but the weekend will be filled with related events. Some of the scheduled events include national competitions for students, hobbyists, and club members, massed band mini-concerts, several "Club-Pub" gatherings (where club members may jam together), workshops, and many performance opportunities.

A number of accordion dignitaries and famed performers will attend and participate in the tribute concert hon-

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oring the prolific work of Palmer and Hughes. New accordion works will be premiered and old favorites will be savored once again. This testimonial weekend provides a rare opportunity to share some intimate reflections of the dreams, untiring efforts and amazing accomplishments of Bill Palmer and his colleague.

A number of innovations are planned for the festival. These include a new category— Competition of the Clubs, which extends a welcome to, and provides a performance stage for, members of accordion clubs from all over the U.S. Accordion concerts and events are planned throughout the city during the festival. An Accordion Day in

Galveston has been proposed as another unique event for the participants. Houston, our fourth largest city, offers many exciting tourist attractions such as Six Flags, Astroworld, Spacecraft Center, etc.

The Event will take place at the JW Marriott Hotel on Westheimer. Special room rate for AAA participants is \$69/room/nite (single, double, or quad). Since rooms at this rate are limited, call early to reserve (1-800-231-6058). Banquet cost will be \$32.50; Tribute concert on the 7th will be \$10/ticket.

Six hundred persons are expected; plan to attend this important accordion event! More details will follow.

Joe Nanut also started a neat feature which all the musicians picked up on during the night. 
eral members remarked later that this was a good way to get to know

A perennial favorite of the club, **Frank Panacci**, brought his wonderful BIC Colombo (140 bass, extended keyboard, dual tone chambers) up for a dazzling expositon of skill. The tones

description of the electronic/MIDI accordion he plays. He said that it is just another variation on the many

variations of accordions. He utilized his program to illustrate how one chooses sounds to fit the particular tune to be played. Frank uses a sound module that provides accompaniment and percussion along with the instrument sounds. He plays professionally for dinners, dances, etc. and finds that his MIDI setup allows him to create music perfectly suited to what his customers want. He illustrated his points with a selection of dance tunes which included Green

Dolphin Street, Begin the Beguine, Ain't She Sweet, Charleston, Fiesta and Caminito.

Piano accordionist Bob Delgado was last on the night's program with a selection of tunes designed to satisfy just about any taste. He played a medley of Sharpshooters and Washington Post Marches, Pretty Baby, a medley of Lonely Lane and Ain't Misbehavin, Tango of Roses, Beautiful Days, Tic Toc Polka and hs own compostion, Tyrolian Echoes Part II.

If you need an idea for a New Year's resolution you might consider volunteering to play at an upcoming meeting. We are always looking for volunteers. Don't be afraid to volunteer if you are a little rusty or feel that you aren't as advanced as some of the other members. There is nothing like an appreciative audience to make you feel great!

Nick Ariondo

Nick Ariondo is a Southern Californian accordion player whom I have never heard, but about whom I have read quite a bit. We have been wanting to profile him in the newsletter for some time, and Alice Hall has collaborated to make this "the time." Nick recently did a stellar performance with the Brentwood Symphony Orchestra and Alice sent us the following article. Thanks Alice! When can Nick play for a BAAC meeting??

The Outlook, a Los Angeles-based newspaper review read as follows: "Accordion strikes notes of surise during symphony opener!".

The Outlook then went on to say: "Nick Ariondo...considered a oneperson crusade against those who would relegate the 'accordion' to the archives of quaint folk instruments. His performance with the symphony of the 'Accordion Concerto in G Minor', a work he wrote with the late Edward Hasharian, took the listener on a consiousness-raising trek into the sonic possibilities of this much maligned instrument. The music began very forceful in the first movement, with strong neo-romantic elements...the remaining movement and the orchestra/audience ovation was well-deserved (and ecstatic!)".

The above quotes were witnessed backstage after Nick Ariondo's brilliant performance of his Accordion oncerto in G minor co-composed with Ed Hosharian.

"I never imagined this instrument sounding so magnificent with a symphony orchestra. I was completely mesmerized!"

Your performance with the orchestra was electrifying!"

"I must congratulate you for an incredible musical experience that I never thought possible on an accordion. You and your instrument were marvelous!"

"This accordion concerto needs to be heard with the Los Angeles Philharmonic and other major orchestras around the world."

"Mr. Ariondo, you have convinced me, I now truly appreciate this marvelous instrument in your precious hands!"

This was an experience of a lifetime for those of us who had the opportunity to attend the October 16th concert featuring Nick Ariondo with the Brentwood Symphony Orchestra, Alvin Mills, conductor, Gevork Gyulatyan, concert pianist.

The Concert Hall, filled with listeners of all ages, were in for a surprise! Yes, indeed...and a surprise never to be forgotten! With the orchestra present and anxiously awaiting, Nick came on stage with pianist Gevork Gyulatyan. Mr. Gyulatyan, a briliant pianist, accompanied Nick Ariondo during the first movement of the concerto.

The orchestra then joined in for a lovely second movement and a powerful closing third movement titled

"Danza Viva." To say the very least, this was a thrilling moment for every one of us! The wonderful combination of strings, woodwinds, brass, percussion and piano, along with the accordion, proved to all of us the importance of the accordion in being presented in this type of setting so seldom heard. But nick Ariondo seems to be changing all that, as he continues showcasing the accordion in sol concert recitals, with chamber music groups and with symphony orchestras (his next symphony concert is in November with the Desert Symphony of Palm Springs).

The reaction of the audience was tremendous. Nick received a standing ovation and three curtain calls with thunderous applause at the end of his riveting performance.

It was so very interesting to watch the expression on people's faces who have never heard or seen an accordion with a symphony orchestra. From the very first note to the very end, Nick proved to the audience at hand that an accordion concerto with symphony orchestra is definitely a winning combination! I myself could not believe this wonderful blend of virtuosic display and musicianship! Wow!!
