BAAC's COTATI BOOTH

BAAC will, as previously, set up a booth at the Cotati Festival this year, probably in front of the Jam Tent. It serves a double purpose; to promote our Club and to turn a little profit.

We'll be selling a big variety of accordion-related items which have never before been available at Cotati or anywhere else on the West Coast, for that matter. We are contracting with SqueezinArt (who advertised in this newsletter a couple months ago) and will sell their t-shirts, caps, note paper, fanny paks, ties, mugs, jewelry and key chains. The current sales plan also includes some Year of the Accordion t-shirts a good supply of 12-bass accordions, and some toy "Hero" accordions, mostly for children. We are *not* attempting to stock tapes and CD's this year.

It's a big job, folks, and Marian Kelly and Michael Sanossian can't do it alone. They are asking for YOUR help manning and womaning our booth. The plan is to have three BAAC members helping in the booth throughout the day (10 to 6). Overlapping shifts will be two hours each. Volunteers will be asked to sign up for a specific time slot on either Saturday or Sunday. At the booth, they will sell the items mentioned above, and they will tell people about our Club and encourage them to become members.

A week or two before the Festival, she will send reminders and booth instructions to volunteers.

our beer mugs when they switched to a couple of Oldies but Goodies, *Five Foot Two* and *Yes Sir, That's My Baby* filled out their repertoire for the evening. Another great job by two fellows who obviously enjoy what they do.

Our next player was a big surprise. At least to me. **Daniel Issacsohn** is a young Swedish player currently studying at the University in Stockholm. He's touring the US playing accordion, and

we were lucky to have him at our Club. He mentioned that he lives in a small town in northern Sweden, about 60 miles from the Arctic Circle. As remote as that is, he managed to receive excellent instruction on the accordion, and his playing was on the same high level with others from Northern Europe whom we have heard. His first selection was an English number arranged by Frosini and featuring a number of variations on the central theme. He followed with Carnival of Venice, which we applauded to the point that Daniel said we had "warmed his heart." (Hopefully he'll carry some of this warmth back to the Arctic Circle.) His final number was a Ukranian Folk Song, Minka, during which he again played different variations on the main theme. **Daniel** is a brilliant player, filled with skill, energy and enthusiasm.

The only down side of Daniel's performance was that (per Peter Di Bono) Daniel played all the songs which Peter had intended to use himself!! Well, Peter managed to find enough notes remaining to do his usual good

job, but I'll wager that he doesn't often follow players who are quite that good. **Pete** began with a French number, written by an Italian, played by an American, etc. **Peter** seems so relaxed and "folksy" on stage that it belies the difficulty of the numbers he plays, and this was no exception. *Valse Tropical* by Andre Astier was next, and it seemed even more complex to me. Diffi-

culty not withstanding, **Peter** saved the best for last — the music from the film <u>Cinema Paradiso</u>, which **Pete** had arranged himself after listening to it on a CD. I really liked it. We may be pretty far from the Arctic Circle, but **Peter** seemed to have managed to get some decent accordion instruction also!

Another surprise! Big surprise. **Nikolai Prisakar**, currently living in Sacramento, and appropriately playing a Weltmeister (World Master) accordion. If there were a World Master Contest, **Nikolai** would be qualified to enter. I have no inkling of the names of his songs, but they were incredibly well played. I wasn't completely certain that his fingers were attached to his hand during the entire performance. The music sounded Eastern European and was full of trills and runs

and molto accelerando. I wish I could say more about our guest — but I can only applaud his obvious excellence.

He told Val Kieser that he sold his car in Russia and bought an accordion, which he brought along to the US. Val's other comments were "Delightful guy, always smiling. He can play along with anyone and make that person sound like a pro with his elaborate fill-ins, even if he doesn't know the song." Welcome, Nikolai, to the US and to the Bay Area Accordion Club. Where are we finding people of this caliber? Whoever is doing it deserves a big hand. I know that **Mary-Alice Eldon** and **Arnie Krenn**, among others, have found some of the terrific surprise talent we've seen in the past year; thanks to all! Attending BAAC meetings is a real delight.

This was the right night for **Henry Doktorski**. Not too many players could have built on the preceeding foundation. Or play everything from the Beatles to Bach...or play accordion with a major symphony orchestra...or be a Masters candidate in music....or

Henry (why do I want to spell that Henri?) is a player whose personality is

as strong and pleasantly impressive as his playing. He wasn't on the stage more than a few minutes when it seemed as if he was an old friend. He was full of interesting and informative anecdotes. all delivered with charm and enthusiasm. For example, doesn't everyone know that the accordion had an official audience with the Pope to determine whether it was appropriate for church music? (Luckily, we passed. Wheewww.) He was kidding, he was quizzing, he was joking, and when he picked up his accordion, he was smoking! With all the good players we hear, I have to constantly search for (new) superlatives. None really does the job in this case. But Henry Doktorski, along with two or three others, belongs to the group of the very best we have heard, in my opinion.

What did he play? He began with a Handel *Prelude* — one of his favorite composers. And he couldn't have looked more relaxed playing it. He followed with a Bach *Prelude* and *Minuet*, interspersed with a story of the traveling salesman who got him started on accordion lessons. Roumanian Folk Dances were next, as was Brahms' *Hungarian Dance #5*, which is also featured on one of his tapes. He lightened up (and easy switch for **Henry**) with the *Paulumbo Polka* which he wrote for a friend's 90th birthday. Among the remaining pieces were *Czardas* by Monti (he quizzed us on the composer), Frosini's *Olive Blossoms*, a waltz serenade, and a dedication to Bill Palmer.

Henry is a very unique talent. I'm

never sure whether I should be encouraged or discouraged after hearing such great playing.

Henry then played several numbers with a "rushed" (a couple hours) version of the Ensemble. The group responded to the challenge with fine arrangements of Pachelbel's *Canon* and a rousing Polka by J S Bach (who perhaps had not been thinking polka when he composed it.) It must have been a pleasure and a bit of an honor to have played with such an outstanding musician as **Henry**.

Thanks, **Henry**, for visiting us and letting us share your talent. Please return soon.

Boggio Article Featured in <u>Keyboard</u>


