

The second half of the meeting was devoted to Henri Ducharme, playing both individually and with his groups. Henri led off with a beautiful French piece called Virtuosité, which he played with impressive smoothness. Because I couldn't write fast enough, and didn't have any list of pieces, I cannot name here all the pieces Henri and his group played, but the list included a slow piece with haunting and sometimes strange harmonies, that Henri had played at a cemetery. His accordion sounded like an organ for this piece. Henri described the piece as "hovering between heaven and earth . . . wraps around itself." He also played a song for which he did not know the translation of the Cyrillic title, so Henri named it (appropriately for Father's Day), "My Father Lifted Me." Henri told the story of how his father sold his own accordion so he could buy one for Henri many years ago.

Then a quartet of Henri's students played some of Guy Klucevsek's music, quite avant-garde but becoming more and more popular. Tangocide has a 7/8 rhythm, difficult to do well, and I was impressed with how well it was played by this quartet. Then a trio of them played a wave song, I think it was called "Wave Hill" or something to that effect, where you could feel the undulation of

the waves, followed by a fast, dissonant piece with a very sudden ending, whose title I did not get.

Next came Henri's full ensemble (or about 10 of the 15 or so total number in the group). They played Bei Mir Bist Du Schoen, arranged by a lovely young lady, a graduate music student who was also in the audience: Carol O'Brien. It was a complicated arrangement that must have been difficult to arrange, let alone play.

Five o'clock came around too soon, and the meeting had to end-but I, for one, enjoyed every minute of it. Val

DIRECTIONS TO NATURE FRIENDS PARK 3115 Butters Drive, Oakland (510) 531-2930

<u>From San Francisco or Northern Peninsula</u>, take the Bay Bridge. While on the bridge, get into the second lane from the right, to make sure that you end up on the correct freeway, which is 580 east (toward Hayward). Once you are on 580, very soon you will see the exit for 24/Walnut Creek. Take that exit. From 24, take the exit "Highway 13 South/Hayward." (It is the next exit after Broadway.) From 13, take the exit "Joaquin Miller Road." (You will also see the Mormon Temple and signs "Chabot Space & Science Center.") Two left turns in quick succession will put you on Joaquin Miller Road. Butters Drive is the second right turn off Joaquin Miller Road (after Hedge Lane). The road twists and turns for a while, and then you will see Nature Friends on the right. It will be marked for the SFAC picnic.

<u>From Central Peninsula</u>, take the San Mateo Bridge. Continue straight through Hayward (this will automatically be Jackson Street). Stay in the middle lane. At a large bank of signals you will automatically be in the correct lane as the road bends left and becomes Foothill Blvd. Stay in that middle lane, which will take you onto 580 West toward Oakland. After about 10 miles you'll see the exit for Highway 13 North/ Berkeley (immediately after Seminary Ave. exit). Take 13 north to Joaquin Miller Road exit; go right onto Joaquin Miller and proceed as above.

<u>From South Bay</u>: Take Dumbarton Bridge. From the bridge, go north on 880; take the Jackson Street exit, go right onto Jackson and proceed as indicated above under "Central Peninsula." There are other ways but this is the simplest.

<u>From Marin County</u>: Take the Richmond Bridge. Continue until freeway merges with highway 80 West. Once you're past University Avenue in Berkeley, stay out of the extreme right lanes or you might end up in San Francisco! Also stay out of the far left lane. This way you will easily get onto 580 East. Then proceed as from SF/ Northern Peninsula above.

If coming *from Contra Costa County*, take 24 west and 13 south and proceed to Joaquin Miller Road, etc. as indicated above.

IT IS NOT AS COMPLICATED AS IT SOUNDS!

What ever happened ...

... to Pietro Deiro Sr.'s beautiful accordion that Vince Cirelli restored and played for us at a club meeting a few years ago? Well, it was supposed to be destined for a museum in Italy but happily ended up in Helmi Harrington's World of Accordions museum, now located in Wisconsin. Here's the story:

Julio Giulietti had heard several years back that the accordion was in a pawn shop, so he went and bought it and gave it to Pietro Deiro, Jr. The accordion, in abysmal condition, lay around Pietro Jr's. house for 3 or 4 years until Vince convinced him to send it out here, for Vince to restore to playing condition. Vince put on new sides, new front, new reeds, rebuilt the keyboard and the bass machine, and then restored and put back the metal decoration.

The accordion, once restored (and demonstrated for our club by Vince), was to be sent back to Pietro Jr.—but he passed away before the accordion was finished. So, the restored accordion was sent instead to Pietro Jr.'s daughter Sandra, intended for the museum in Italy that was founded by Pietro Sr. Meanwhile, Henry Doktorski wrote his book, The Brothers Deiro and Their Accordions, which of course included this accordion. Henry had donated Guido Deiro's accordion to Helmi Harrington's World of Accordions museum, and so he got Pietro Deiro Jr.'s daughter Sandra to donate Pietro's accordion to the museum so that the museum has both accordions. That's the story, lovingly told by Vince Cirelli.


Galla-Rini Camp in San Diego July 24-29


