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
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#### **Bay Area Accordion Club PICNIC**

### Across the Editor's Desk.....

Dear Marian;

Hope everything is well for you. Just thought I'd keep in touch. I don't know if I told you that I'm back in school, working towards a masters degree in composition at Duquesne University Graduate School of Music. This keeps me very busy, but I also get to perform my favorite music (classical) on my favorite instrument (accordion) now and then.

I have two significant dates on my calendar: September 18th I perform with the Pittsburgh New Music Ensemble in Hindemith's Kammermusik #1.

But I especially look forward to my engagement with the Pittsburgh Symphony Orchestra next season. Two weeks ago I auditioned for Lorin Maazel, music director of the P.S.O.

Some of my orchestra friends warned me that Mr. Maazel was an extremely demanding conductor and had some negative experiences with accordionists. Either due to insufficient technique or not being able to follow the conductor, etc., they were not up to his standard. So I was expecting an extremely sharp critique of my playing. Luckily, I had recently performed with the Pittsburgh New Music Ensemble and the Duquesne Contemporary Ensemble under the direction of conductor David Stock, so I felt quite sure that I would be able to follow Mr Maazel's baton.

When I entered his office he said gravely, "I've written a cello concerto for Mstislav Rostropovich which includes a very important part for accordion." He asked me to play some excerpts from his piece and also something of my own choosing. I warmed up with a movement from a Handel keyboard suite and then played excerpts from his concerto. Within a few moments Mr. Maazel's serious countenance was transformed into a large smile.

After I finished, he welcomed me into the orchestra and we chatted for some time. He said that he loves the sound of the accordion and wants to compose more music for it, if I would help him to learn more about the limitations and capabilities of the instrument. I agreed and he thanked me.

I think this may be significant for music lovers in general and accordionists in particular, because Maestro Maazel is retiring next year from his post as music director of the PSO (leaving a salary of \$1.2 million/year!) in order to compose full-time. I hope to see more orchestral works in the future from his pen which include accordion.

I'll be performing with the PSO in the world premiere of "Music for Violoncello and Orchestra" by Lorin Maazel, with Mstislav Rostropovich at Heinz Hall on May 2, 3, and 4, 1996

After I graduate next Spring I hope to find a position teaching theory at the college level.

## Wisdom and Wit from the Internet

The accordion-interest newsgroup in the Internet is a constant source of accordion information, some of it important and some less so. We show below a few of the messages which have come over our wires in the last few months. (By the way, if you have Internet access, you can join this group by sending a message to accordion-request@cs.cmu.edu and saying "please subscribe".)

Here's an informative testimonial concerning the most well known accordion orchestra in the U.S.:

The University of Missouri-Kansas City Accordion Orchestra is conducted by Joan Cochran Sommers who does most of our arrangements; however we also perform some pre-existing arrangements which Joan usually will "fatten" up. UMKC has a "unique" sound due to the use of elektronium, tenor and bass cordions as well as a full ensemble of

rcussion including harp when called for.

The orchestra is a virtuoso group. Most of us have studied at the conservatory using the accordion as a major instrument, but there are junior high and high school students as well as members who play for fun. The orchestra usually averages about 25-30. We perform pieces from Scherazade and Sorcerer's Apprenctice to Michael Jackson medleys, complete with singers and dancers all arranged by Joan. We even did an ET medley which the composer, John Williams, thought was great, again arranged by Joan. We here at UMKC are really fortunate to have Joan.

The accordion program at the Conservatory is fully accredited and has been since 1961. The program has been designed for students who have an interest in pursuing a Bachelor's, Master's or a Doctorate degree in music using the ac-

:dion as their performing instrument. Joan is internationally recognized as an accomplished performer, teacher, Questioner Bob Wallis: Some of you may already know: Here in the United States the month of June has been designated "National Accordion Awareness Month!" Is there a foundation?

Responder John Peter Giunta of Vienna, VA: Yes, Bob, there is a foundation.

BW: Is a cure in sight?

JPG: The only curable symptom of this killer condition is the clef palate. As accordionists, we should look at Congressional notes and ask, "Are they in or out?" They will soon C that they can't have it both ways. Former US President James K. Polka mused on this.

conductor and clinician. She has also written and published numerous arrangements for accordion solo and orchestra as well as doing a variety of research on numerous topics pertaining to the accordion. In 1980, she was awarded a research grant to attend the Vogtland Music Days in Klingenthal, Germany where she studied the instruments (bayans) and music used by the competitors from the former Soviet Union. In addition to her research at Klingenthal, she has been invited to give master classes and presentations in Norway and Poland. In 1988, Joan was invited by the All-China Accordion Teachers' Association to teach, to rehearse orchestras, and to conduct master classes, lectures, and performances as both a soloist and in chamber music.
