Dear Members and Friends,

Attention, anybody in or near the South Bay: SAN JOSE MEET-INGS to be HELD the Second Sunday of July, August, and September (not the third Sunday as previously announced. That's the big news this month! We've decided to hold a second monthly meeting, this one located in San Jose, close to so many of you who have been telling us for years that you either can't or don't wish to drive all the way to San Francisco very often. I've heard several people say that they declined to rejoin BAAC because they knew they wouldn't be able to come to meetings anyway, since they lived one to two hours away, and therefore didn't see much point in joining. Those folks won't see this message, so we're asking you to pass the word about our new meeting site on to any non-member accordion lovers that you know.

Here are some details: We'll hold the meeting at the *Germania Restau*rant banquet room, beginning at 3:00PM on Sunday, July 12th and lasting until 6 or 7 or whenever. Actually, we can stay so long as we're enjoying ourselves (reasonably sedately, of course). The address is 261 N. 2nd Street, close to downtown, in San Jose. Cross street is Julian; the building is a big blue victorian-style "house". Phone number there is (408) 295-4486. There's a parking lot right next door, you'll be pleased to hear.

The *Germania's* banquet room is about half the size of Donworth (maybe a little less.). It's outfitted with a small stage (less than a foot high, if I recall), and many tables and chairs around the stage. Off to the left is an elevated area with more tables and chairs, just a little bit separate from the main area. The *Germania* is a functioning restaurant, so you'll be able to obtain drinks in great variety (including some of that great German beer, if you wish) and, later in the afternoon, some food. A waitress will be available to serve us food in the banquet room, so we won't need to leave the accordion music.

The proprietor of the *Germania* has agreed to let us use his facilities for a three month trial period without paying him any rent. Therefore, no door charge at the *Germania*. However, he is expecting that our members will patronize the bar





Board Meeting Synopsis

(both May and June)

"FINANCES: At the end of April, we had \$9960.88 in our combined bank accounts. Normal monthly expenses for rent (Donworth, \$150, Moose, \$90, newsletter about \$375) always exceed revenue, so the bank numbers has been dropping. In May, though, we incurred some once-a year expenses. We paid \$775 for liability insurance and \$500 to the Cotati Festival (we'll recoup it selling accordions during the Festival), resulting in a net loss for the month of \$1901. We'll publish detailed financial statements at the end of the year.

"MEETING LOCATION. We've held several discussions about Donworth and other possible meeting locations. All agree that the stage at Donworth is too high necessitating formal performances, that the acoustics make it very difficult to have more than one person playing at a time and rendering jamming impossible, that the parking is wonderful and the rent quite reasonable. We'd like to find a less formal spot, but haven't figured out where yet. So for now, we are tinkering with the Donworth setup. We'll experiment with arranging chairs differently, not using the stage, not turning on all the lights, moving our vendors around. If you have suggestions, we'd like to hear from you.

Accordion to Boaz

In my last column, I discussed five major factors that affect the value of an accordion: reeds, manufacturer, tone chamber, size and color. In that column I covered reeds. This month I will tackle the tone chamber.

Chamber Music

First of all, just what is a tone chamber? Even experienced accordionists have asked me this question. The short answer is that it is a resonating chamber that adds quality to the sound of the instrument and its operation. Imagine your accordion as a box: with the bellows as the sides, the bass soundboard as the bottom, and the treble soundboard as the top of the box; the tone chamber runs the length of the box and is mounted beneath its top, the treble sound board. The chamber is open at the top, so that if you were to look down into your accordion with the grill off, you could see into the tone chamber. The set or sets of reeds that are said to be"in the chamber" are mounted to the side of the tone chamber in such a way that they are parallel to the sound board.

Part of the effect of the tone chamber is caused by this turning of the reeds on their sides. This creates a more efficient surface for the pressure from the bellows to act on, making the reeds more responsive. The increased responsiveness allows you to play softer, faster, and with less work because the reeds need less air.

Some manufacturers (notably Guerrini) have attempted to duplicate this increased efficiency without a tone chamber, by building a T-shaped reed block that presents the reeds at a similar angle. But the tone chamber does more than just increase the reponsiveness of the reeds. It also improves sound projection, operating something like a horn. Most importantly, it changes the sound of the accordion. A good quality reed in a tone chamber sounds less bright and more mellow, like a saxophone. This is particularly important to jazz musicians, those who play pop standards, classical musicians and those who play the classic Italian repertoire.

Chamber of Horas

The tone chamber is not all a bed of roses. Tone chambers have two valves for every key instead of one, a valve in the chamber and one outside the chamber. This increases the up-front cost of the accordion, and the maintenance cost down the road. A keyboard overhaul on a tone chamber-equipped accordion is much more time consuming and therefore more expensive. Any repair work on such an accordion needs to be done by a well-trained and experienced mechanic, because of the complex mechanisms involved. Improper repairs to an accordion with a tone chamber can result in poor compression. There are plenty of situations where you might not want a tone chamber. Certainly where weight is the primary concern a tone chamber is to be avoided. For most folk dance music, a tone chamber doesn't fill the bill. Musicians who play Zydeco, Norteno, Irish, Balkan and other folk dance music usually prefer the bright and lively tone of a chamberless model, often with a moderate mussette tuning.

Buyer's tip:

Some accordion names have stronger followings than others. Such instruments are preceded by their reputations and often command higher prices than instruments of comparable quality (but less renown). For instance, La Melodiosa or Columbo may sell for half the price of a comparable Giulletti.

When sizing up a used accordion, consider the name ... but don't let it blind you to the real quality of the instrument. This applies to new instruments as well. New accordions come at all levels of quality, and a new squeezebox isn't automatically better than a used one. Never trade in your top quality used accordion in good shape on a poor quality new accordion. Don't be led astray by a glamorous name, a new price tag or a pretty color. If you aren't sure, get an appraisal and a second opinion from someone you trust.
