The San Francisco Accordion Chamber Ensemble (ACE), which now is officially affiliated with BAAC, gave a very successful concert at the Accordion Lovers Society International (A.L.S.I.) on Sunday, February 13. Even Maestro Galla-Rini, now 96 years old, came to see and hear us, and told me he wouldn't have missed it for the world! That was a great effort on his part, and we were both moved and flattered.

The nine of us (Aldo Argenti, Mary-Alice Eldon, Lynn Ewing, Ron Harris, Val Kieser, Nora Mazzara, Frank Montoro, Bob Smith, Sharon Walters) and Joe Smiell, our director/arranger and conductor, arrived on Saturday from all directions, in time to have a dress rehearsal at the church hall.

Also rehearsing was San Diego's own ACE ensemble (theirs is called Accordion Concert Ensemble) under the capable direction of Joanne Pilgrim, a wonderful musician who also is a student of Maestro Galla-Rini. Their group is just getting underway with serious music and rehearsals, using much of Maestro Galla-Rini's arrangements and some of Joe's arrangements. We enjoyed their performance very much, and realized how far we have come since we were just starting out as a serious group. Joe had some excellent pointers for the new group, which

The meeting on Sunday had a few individual performers besides the ensembles, but the ensembles were by far the larger part of the show. Both ensembles actually played better than they had played at Saturday's rehearsal! The San Diego group played five numbers before our group played, and then both our groups played one number together—excerpts from Handel's Fireworks, with Joe conducting. Then, after intermission, our ACE group put on its full concert, and brought the house down! The audience was very attentive and quiet, which was much appreciated. I was told that it was the largest attendance they ever had. I forget the exact number, but it was well over 100 people. It seems everyone wanted to talk to us afterward. We felt like celebrities!

Following the concert, several of us, including Joe, went out to dinner with a group of A.L.S.I. members before leaving San Diego. The weekend was a great experience, and I'm sure we'll be doing it again!


Dennis Stoscher came on next, preferring to present his offerings down in front of the stage. Spinning lots of anecdotes about personal ex-


After the intermission we got to the serious part of the night's program with members Mike Zampiceni and Bart Beninco. Mike led off by showing off his spectacular technique with

a variety of songs that showcased what the classic accordion should sound like. *Espana Cana, I Got Rhythm, Take The A Train*, a medley of Irish tunes, *La Cumparsita*, and two of my favorites *Blue Tango*, and *Flight Of The Angels*. In addition to dazzling the audience with his technique, Mike played requests from the audience, no easy job not knowing what might be asked for, like *Granada* and *Tico Tico*, but Mike took it in stride and showed why he is an artist of the highest caliber. Thank you Mike!

Our final performer of this momentous evening was introduced by an avid admirer who also happened to be his student, Kris Nelson. Paying a very nice tribute to his teacher, Kris brought Bart Beninco to the stage to give us an emotional performance that will not soon be forgotten. Playing challenging numbers one after another, Bart sported his Giulietti with the fabulous sound legendary of quality accordions made in the 50's. Syncopated Clock, Ferryboat Serenade, Chitarra Romana, Dark Eyes, Peanut Vendor, and Polka For Dorothy. But the one that took us all by surprise was his fantastic rendition of The Lost Chord! I had not heard of this piece, but it is one that I'll never forget. Playing with such emotion and feeling Bart turned his Giulietti into a venerable church organ sending shivers through the audience with his majestic presenta-

tion. Bart is a very animated performer showing the emotion that comes from within, moving back and forth with full use of bellows capacity. Needless to say, a standing ovation was the obvious result of his stirring offering, a most lovely gift to our opening night festivities...

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Dick Contino in Lodi...March 19th

What does one think of when considering a trip to hear the virtuoso of the classic Italian accordion, Dick Contino? Well, to enjoy to the fullest, great renditions of the accordion classics, Italian love songs, the vocals, the comments about history and philosophy, all with unique stylings from one of the most superlative accordionists of all time. A treat at any time to see and hear, and for me to experience as often as I can.

And so I took the 2 hour pilgrimage to Lodi with my daughter to hear the Great One! And it was all there....in bits and pieces that is. The tender "Mama" and "You'll Never Walk Alone". "Yours" with such unique phrasing that it catches one by surprise that an artist can be so creative with an oft played standard. The great dynamics of taking songs from the whisper of "Twilight Time", to the grandiose playing of "Sunrise, Sunset" and "Glory Hallelujah". Songs embellished by such Contino creations as triple bellow shakes, finger rolls combined with melody an octave higher, octave and chord glissando explosions, pushing the dynamics to unparalleled heights! So many great renditions of favorites being played that we Contino trekies hunger for ... and travel miles to hear. And come we did, 250-300 fans crowding the hall, women going to the stage to hug, kiss, and adore him ... Wow, why didn't I keep up my practice! Who else in our accordion world engenders such excitement and praise....

But today, the Contino magic was in trouble...a lack of a defined program, inexperienced side men unrehearsed for the performance, wrong rhythms, errant backup chording, songs being stopped for adjustment, and....a sound mix not only too loud overall, but distorting the sound of Dick's Petosa along with his having to compete in volume with the sound of the electronic keyboard. Midway through the second performance we beat a hasty retreat to save our ear drums and sensibilities. Not a pretty sound, or experience; small wonder half the audience left before the second show. Hopefully Dick will realize that his enormous following of faithful fans deserves better, and he is the only one that can give it to them! 53 years of belting out the same tunes can be mighty trying...but as the adoration to him must be incredibly satisfying He needs to return the same measure of respect!

And Kudos to the Good Time Accordion Club, including our own Steve Balich, who provided some very nice dance music for the event.... D. S.

Tango Moods

Peter Soave & The Rucner String Quartet (Jazzette Records BPCD 042) Review by Paul A. Magistretti



The proliferation of performers attempting Piazzolla these days is endemic, so new additions aren't always a cause for celebration. However, Tango Moods is authentic and deeply moving. Peter Soave has all the firepower and passion necessary.

While the maestro's music is never less than intrigu-

ing he has in recent years become a commercial force. So whatever has been composed and/or recorded by him-even if flawed-appears. Various artists are coming out of the woodwork doing his stuff. Some good-Yo Yo Ma (Soul of the Tango)-but most of them: forgetaboutit. Forays into Piazzolla can be exercises in avarice, hubris or aesthetic amnesia, like opera singers doing pop or Ho-wood actors diddling Hamlet. In the case of Tango Moods don't forgetaboutit; it's genuine and rocks.

The first cut, Adios Nonino, is poignant. Soave and the Rucner Quartet give it a plaintiff performance-it's only the opening act.

The heart of this CD is Piazzolla's evocative tango suite, Five Tango Sensations. This performance of the work is stunning. The suite is comprised of five distinct moods: Asleep, Loving, Anxiety, Despertar (awakening, reviving) and Fear. The work was originally written for the Kronos Quartet and recorded with Piazzolla playing the bandoneon in 1990. While the Kronos version is interesting, it always left me unmoved. It seemed cool, aloof, academic-as if Kronos was giving a fine reading, but nothing heartfelt. I hypothesized that Kronos' previous success with Piazzolla, Four for Tango, had committed everyone to a sequel. Whatever the reason, I felt surprisingly distanced by Piazzolla's playing. He was technically good, but somehow stiff, detached and cool. The lack of heat made me think his performance was dubbed-Kronos did its thing and sent the tapes to Astor who put on a headset and did his. True or not, the record has a disembodied effect-and Piazzolla was always his best in real time where everyone is right there bouncing off each other.

So, having addressed the initial performance of Five Tango Sensations let me say that Peter Soave and the

Rucner Quartet have delivered a definitive, heated and live rendering. Peter exceeds Piazzolla in feeling and passion. If you doubt, comparisons can be made by listening to the solo moments of Asleep and Despertar. While Piazzolla has precision in all the right places, his runs and staccati seem cold and abrupt; Soave's playing is fluid, warm and filled with emotion. Maybe Piazzolla's concept was to intrude stops and tears in the fabric-a quality of intellectual alienation. There is neither intentional nor unintentional alienation in Soave's playing or the Rucner Quartet's interplay. Each time I listen I feel involved in the various movements as if I was ingesting them in my soul-furthermore, complex and ever changing stories unfold in my imagination. I can't help but believe Piazzolla wanted to create exactly the kind of riveting experience that the Soave/ Rucner performance delivers. By itself the Rucner Quartet is more intense, passionate and unbridled than Kronos.

This CD by Peter Soave is an amazing beginning. He has reinvented himself as a world-class bandoneon player without qualification-living proof that a choice of instruments is less important than the soul of an artist. NORMAN SEATON AND THE TEXAS ACCORDION ASSOC. PUT ON ANOTHER GREAT SHOW!

I just returned from my third time at the TAA National Accordion Convention in Plano, Texas. I must say, Norm Seaton knows how to organize a great convention! Each year it gets more exciting, with more knock-your-socks-off entertainment!

On Friday night the orchestra performed an all-patriotic program, conducted by Maj. Lois Tilley, who is wonderful to work with. Veterans were allowed in free. Saturday night's program featured, in addition to the orchestra conducted by Gary Daverne (see below): Jason Stephen of Kansas City, who is the 1999/200 U.S. accordion Entertainment Champion and winner of numerous other awards; Tony Lovello, fabulous entertainer whom we will hear at our BAAC meeting in May; Lidia Kaminska, a Polish accordion virtuoso, and other top-notch entertainers.

Even with my years of experience with the SF Accordion Chamber Ensemble, I found it an invigorating challenge to play with 40 accordionists, arranged like a symphony orchestra, under Gary Daverne, who is conductor of the Auckland, N.Z. symphony! We played some dynamite great semiclassical stuff, including the William Tell Overture (yes, VERY fast!), Radetzky March, a Rhapsody written by Gary Daverne in the 1980's especially for a symphony orchestra with an accordion soloist. In our case the soloist was Kevin Friedrich, originally from New Zealand himself, who plays both piano and chromatic with equal facility. He used the chromatic in our orchestra. Although this piece has been performed many,

many times over the years, I believe I heard that this was the first time that the orchestra also was made up of accordions!

Kevin Friedrich was also a solo performer on one of the evenings, and was specially honored in a 20-minute ceremony on Saturday night, for all he does to promote the accordion. He is an incredible player and a real asset to the accordion world. The honor was well deserved, as anyone who knows Kevin will agree.

Needless to say, the house was packed both nights, and Norm Seaton was a star MC, as always!

Workshops were also a main part of the convention, covering every possible aspect of accordion playing, by very well qualified teachers from all over the country, some of whom were also among our star performers (Kevin Friedrich, Tony Lovello, Jim Rommel, Jane Cristison and others). Our own Valarie Morris gave an excellent workshop on "Surviving Without a Teacher," that was very well attended.

Add to all that the many, many rooms used solely for accordion dealers, of both new and used accordions, both MIDI and acoustic, button boxes, chromatics, every type of accordion imaginable.

The TAA has already reserved the Holiday Inn in Plano for next year's convention, so mark you r calendar now and try to go if you can: you won't be sorry! Next year's dates: March 15-17, 2001.

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
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
