

March Meeting By Dick Schiller

"It was a dark and stormy night" (as they say), but Patio Espanol was alive with good fellowship, wonderful music and the sumptuous food offerings from members Dom and Fran Benedetto, our own veteran restaurateurs—wow, are we lucky, or what?

Before the meeting Reno Pucci (believe it or not, my first accordion teacher way back when), started us off in the mood, showing off his years of entertainment experience with lively old favorites. Across the room Dennis Stoscher was tickling the keys on his new Fisart, with Mark Zhagel doing the same in yet another area.

Our new president Val welcomed some 80-plus to this wonderful evening, welcoming guests, and presenting to the club a huge restored picture of old time member artists of the original San Francisco Accordion Club, circa 1916 (remember, we were the first in the world!). Val and John Kieser had the work done and presented it to the club. What a treasure—everyone should see it!

After some announcements, Val introduced our M.C. for the evening, Lynn Ewing who, with friendly and warm persona, got us underway. But, wait a minute.....before we could begin, Bob Berta rushed to the stage to recount a recent experience of Dennis Stoscher, who was arrested for "flashing" in a Safeway store! Well, he didn't get arrested, but he did "flash" his accordion—that is, from underneath his raincoat to startled customers in the aisle of pickled herring! To cheers and applause, Dennis proceeded to belt out some lively tunes and draw a crowd. Talk about inventive genius! Leave it to Dennis to put our beloved accordion "out there"!

First to play for our waiting crowd was none

other than Father Joe Baccellieri from Portland, Oregon. Father Joe started out by telling us a little about his history with the accordion. He started playing in 1946 (A.D., that is!). This got us going, and his quips and stories between his musical lnumbers I'm sure made us all feel that we were part of his "flock." Father Joe then brought us some "old time accordion"music in a very masterful way (with thanks to Joe Greco for the loan of his Petosa for Father Joe to play!): Accordiana (Magnante); O Sole Mio (It's Now or Never); his own rousing rendition of Dark Eyes; a soft and mellow I Left My heart in San Francisco; a difficult arrangement of the great accordion classic, Tico-Tico; a very sensitive and beautiful Prelude to Act III from La Traviata; and, by audience request, a barn-burning rendition of Granada. His encore offering was a very moving and romantic I Love You More Each Day, written by his teacher, ther late Joe Parente. Thank you, Father Joe. We look forward to having you back anytime you can come!

Next, our own Reno Di Bono brought his MIDI and 4-track recorder to show how we can arrange our accordion playing to sound like a combo or even a band. He laid down a rhythm track and recorded the accordion melody of Mala Femmena with it. Then, playing back that track, he added MIDI instrument sounds using his keyboard; i.e., guitar, bass, vibes, and choral

voices. The finished product was a very professionalsounding recording that sounded like a multi-instrument group. Reno then demonstrated with Volare and also Darktown Strutters Ball, showing again how versatile our accordion is-and right up to date with the computer age! Thank you, Reno, for a great demontration- and, by the way, great voice!

Our final performer was none other than Irish button box virtuoso Andrew MacNamara, who came straight from the airport to debut his San Francisco performances at our club! Thanks to Boaz accordions playing tidbits that few people are aware of. and Val, we old-time, dyed-in-the-wool accordion purists got to enjoy some terrific accordion music from another part of the world, quite different from the music we are accustomed to.

Andrew played on his two-row, diatonic button accordion, meaning that, with a given button pressed down, a different note sounds with the changing of the direction of the bellows. With only two rows of treble and eight bass buttons, Andrew put out an amazing amount of music. Now if we stop and think variety? Father Joe, Andrew of it, we can appreciate the immense talent needed to MacNamara, Reno di Bono-every produce the notes. Just watching his bellow manipulation, at times moving like a vibration in and time got away from us a bit, out, made us appreciate his technique that much more, and showed that this type of instrument produces accents in the music that are difficult if not impossible to duplicate on other accordions.

Andrew played a great variety of jigs, reels and hornpipes, with a spirit that had us tapping our feet and bobbing our heads to this wonderful solo instrument performance.

His final pieces were requests from the audience: Silver Spear and Danny Boy-played as only an Irish musician could play them. Wanting to add to this experience, I journeyed to the Plough & Stars Irish pub on Clement Street on another night to hear Andrew. This time he teamed up with an old-time Irish guitar player. What an experience!

The accordion and guitar combination produced such a driving rhythm that I wanted to get up and dance, but I couldn't-because the young folks there danced a particular dance pattern to a particular rhythm, i.e., hornpipe, jig and reel. It reminded me somewhat of square dance, but these young people were twirling, two-stepping, clogging, all flawlessly executing their specific patterns. So, get out your dancing shoes: Free Irish dance lessons are available on Thursdays at 7:30 at 22nd and Lawton in The City.

Guess who won the raffle? Why, Ed Zaro, our long-time videographer, who's always there, meeting after meeting, year after year, recording the history of our club for posterity. Way to go Ed!

Last came Joe Smiell's Scale Study workshop. With the hour rather late by that time, some people had to leave early. Nevertheless, those who stayed were rewarded with ensemble


Who is Playing Where?

"Musette" The Wrong Word for the Right Tune! By BAAC member Bernard Métais Reprinted from <u>Accordion World</u> July 1993

Editor's Note (By the Editor of Accordion World): When we hear the word "Musette" the mind conjures up Paris, red wine, fresh baguettes and sidewalk cafés with colorful umbrellas. Those of us who have our treble switches named will think of the 3 reed combination with two of the three reeds tuned one sharp and the other flat, producing a coarse, but attractive sound. It is said that there is an "Italian musette," a "German musette" and a "French musette" sound, all distinctly different, but this is probably just a particular tuning that was used by Italian, German and French accordion manufacturers.

Interestingly enough, the term "musette" has a defined and historial meaning which our "French connection," correponsdent Bernard Métais of California, but now back living in his native France, shared with us at last year's Galla-Rini Accordion Camp. We have reproduced Bernard's account of the origin of "musette" as he narrated it to us in his charming French style. (Accordion World was edited by John and Ellen Bonica of Portland.)

"Musette"

When one hears the word "musette," Paris comes to mind. The "musette" is a unique expression of a place and an era: Paris and the early 1900's; even if the word is a misnomer.

Originally, a "musette" was a kind of bagpipe, played by the rural population of the "Auvergne," a province in the center of France. At the end of the 19th century, many "Auvergnats" emigrated from their native province to Paris. Some of them combined the sale of the coal imported from the Auvergne with the sale of drinks and simple meals. On Sundays the proprietors (the "bougnats") organized dances for their friends where they played their native instrument: the musette. Such community dances were called "bals à la musette."

Other immigrants also came to Paris, which, at the

turn of the century, was a haven for immigrants. Among them, after 1870, the Italians, who, like the auvergnats, brought with them their musical instrument: the accordion, which has been produced in Italy in the Castelfidardo workshops since 1860. They also settled in the same marginal parts of Paris as the auvergnats and therefore competed against them in the Sunday community balls with their accordions. In the end the Italians won and the "bals musette" took place with the sound of the accordion—no longer with the sound of the musette.

From the strong Italian (the *bel canto*) and auvergnat (the bourrie--a type of polka) flavors, the "musette" became typically Parisian, with its unmistakable sound of the button accordion. The genre "musette" was born with the sound of accordions not always in perfect tune.

During the first half of the 20th century more than 300 "bals musette" opened in Paris, most of them in seedy areas of town such as Rue de Lappe, near "la Bastille" (now becoming terribly "yuppie").

In the years of the 1930's in Paris, the accordion became fashionable and many accordionists became famous, among them many of Italian origin (Albert and Emile Carrara, Joseph Colombo, Louis Ferrari, Auerino, Tony Murena ...).

After a decline in the 70's and 80's the accordion is experiencing a renaissance in Paris. If you are in Paris, please go to the Balajo, near the Place de la Bastille. You will hear the musical heartbeat of true Paris.
