

## In Memoriam: Ray Ciardella

In the '50s and '60s, the accordion was king in San Francisco and the Bay Area. So many great artists including George Cerutti, Carl Fortina, Art Van Damme, Jim Boggio, Lou Casalnuovo, Tommy Gumina, Dick Gumina, Jim Hillman and many others were pushing the envelope in the area of swing jazz, bringing the accordion to acceptance in an area previously reserved to "traditional" instruments.

And so our own Ray Ciardella, home from the Army and involved as a family man with his wife Rita and son, Ray pursued his livelihood as a mechanic and car restorer, while becoming swept away with a love for not only the accordion but also the hot music scene that many of his friends and visiting artists were involved with. Thus Ray decided to become part of that scene and, according to his good friend and SFAC member Steve Cannata (Steve was one of the great accordion artists, holding court for years at the William Tell Hotel with zither and bass), Ray started taking lessons from John Pezzolo and local famed jazz artist Bud Seghieri. "Ray was a natural musician, and didn't have to take a lot of lessons." Steve remembers. "He played with precision using large chords and an easy swinging style." Encouraged by friend Paul Pizzi, Ray started playing, and for many years performed with a trio with Bob Siebold on sax and horns, plus a drummer, playing many engagements including a regular stint at the Moose Lodge and also the Copperwood Lodge, both in Colma. When he wasn't playing, Ray went, on occasion, with his group of friends that included George Poli, Roy Roselli, Max Del Fonte, Sal Cavallero, George Linale, and many others, to hear the best accordion music our area has to offer, and there was plenty to feast the senses on.

Recently Ray recounted how he had witnessed an all-night duel between Jim Boggio and Ernie Felice at a club in North Beach, both taking chorus after chorus and then ad-libbing in harmony in an incredible display of musical artistry. I said that we needed to chronicle some of his great memories of those glory days, but unfortunately I didn't act quickly enough. In later years, felled by severe arthritis, Ray gave up his playing but continued to support the art at performances and club activities along with Rita, his wife of 51 years, and his long-time friend Vince Cirelli. He passed too early at age 77, a great friend, Ray Ciardella. DS

of his innovative fingering techniques for accordion. Where the piano version goes below the range of accordion keys, Bob smoothly and seamlessly continues the run in the bass! Bob also plays Nola at a reasonable pace, without letting it "run away" from him, not an easy feat when you realize how accordion players tend to play faster and faster if the song is lively. Bob also played the Czardas of Monti masterfully. Nice job, Bob, and a great opener at our new digs!

Next up was Michael Sanossian whose playing, to my ear, is improving at a rapid rate. Michael played two Slovenian polkas, Cleveland style; then a tango, Carina, and an Italian musette waltz, Remembrances. Thanks, Michael, and don't wait for us to ask: just let us know when

you're ready to play for us again!

Intermission, in the beautiful Atrium, included an elaborate

buffet of absolutely great food, prepared and set out by-who else?- Frances and Domenic Benedetto. Sadly, Domenic's mom had passed away just days before, and yet here he was, working for his club. You two

Joe told us some interesting stories, including how he suddenly remembered every note of Il Bersagliere that he hadn't heard in many decades, and which brought back to him some very poignant memories. Playing in the ACE Ensemble at this meeting were Aldo Argenti, Jr., Peter Di Bono, Reno Di Bono, Mary-Alice Eldon, Lynn Ewing, Valerie Kieser, Nora Mazzara, Frank Montoro, Bob Smith and Sharon Walters.



### <u>A Great New Amp</u> by Paul Henning

A few months ago I talked with Cary Nasatir of the Nasatir School of Percussion in Castro Valley, CA. I told Mr. Nasatir I was looking for an amplifier that would amplify electronic and acoustic accordion sounds giving a warm feeling to the acoustic accordion sound. He said, "I have just what you're looking for!" He said it is the Genz Benz UC5-112T.

I tried the amp with my MIDI-Excelsior accordion and it blew me away. Not only did the electronic sounds come out with great clarity, but the amplified acoustic accordion sounds were warm and clear with no distortion. This is the amp I'd been looking for. I also tried this amp in a five-piece band and guess what? The guitar player didn't even drown me out, although I was using the UC5 12" extension speaker on this gig. The extension speaker is great too—it even has a storage area on top for cords, mics, and \_

other stuff.

This amp has everything you need in one piece, such as 200-watt power amp, 5 channels, and Alesis digital effects processor. If you should have a problem with the amp, it slides out and you can send it in for repair. It's also a great PA. Some of the top features of this amp are:

\* 3-band equalization on each channel

\* Alesis DSP with 15 preset digital effects

\* 200-watt dual output amp designed to run up to four 8 ohm cabinets

\* Phantom power source

\* XLR direct out

\* Internal fan cooling

- \* 12" woofer and compression tweeter
- \* Speaker stand mountable
- \* Weight about 48 lbs.

All I can say is, this amp gets a thumbs-up in my book—so much so, that I bought one, along with the external speaker. I also bought two kangaroo covers on-line for \$380. These are great too. They're padded and look as if they will last a lifetime.


