### Henry Doktorski's New Book, The Classical Squeezebox

is Now Available.

In speaking of his title, Henry says, " I wanted to use in the title an informal word which would apply to all (or nearly all) of the free-reed instruments, not just the accordion. This book is about much more than the accordion per se; only three chapters (four, nine and ten) deal exclusively with that instrument, as most of the other ten chapters deal mainly with other free-reed instruments, such as the concertina, harmonium, bandoneon, bayan, etc."

The thirteen chapter titles include information about the classical useage of each type of free-reed instrument, such as Harmonium, Concertina, Accordion, Bandoneon, Bayan. The last two chapters concern the "crisis of the Classical Squeezebox" and the future of the Classical Squeezebox."

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


# \$5/person, in advance or at the gate, 12 and under free.

#### The Accordion-Concertina Repair and Technician's School (ARTS)

During April I was able to participate in a wonderful month-long seminar at the only accordion repair technician's school in the US! There is only one other in the world — at the Hohner factory in Germany. The school is connected with the only true Accordion Museum in the U.S., containing over 600 accordions and related instruments such as diatonic button boxes. bandoneons. concertinas (with many Chemnitz types as well as early Anglo and English types). The collection includes some of the very earliest accordions from around 1830.

The museum is located in a former church in Duluth. I like to think of it as a shrine to the accordion, with its patron saint, Our Lady of Spain.

As participants, we were allowed to handle and play on almost all of the instruments. We were required to learn to play at least a few simple songs on all of the major types of instruments. We were able to understand the relation between the simple one-row button box, the multi-row models, the diatonic concertinas, and the bandoneons. We played not only on piano accordions, but also on button chromatic accordions of the "C" and "B" systems, including some Russian bayans of world class caliber. We played on a wide range of quality of instruments from inexpensive student models to "world class" instruments. I was very pleased to be allowed to play on some very fine Titano accordions, and on the Hohner "Gola" and "Marino" accordions.

I enjoyed playing on some of the unusual instruments such as one with the piano keyboard that curved around to follow the hand as it swings around with the elbow position fixed in space. Another accordion was extremely narrow and squat, with keys on the right hand curved around to approximately follow the curve of the hand. The buttons on the left followed a similar pattern. My favorite of the unusual types is one with a very strong slant (about 45 degrees) on the keyboard. I found it very easy to play, since it virtually eliminated the bent wrist that most of us use while playing a standard piano accordion.

In the repair workshop we learned the fundamentals of accordion repair and maintenance. That included evaluation, basic cleaning, bellows repair (including corners and re-taping), disassembly of the right and left keyboards, repairing key pallets, marking bass buttons, celluloid repair, re-waxing reeds, and various tuning techniques. Even more important, since this was only a one-month course instead of the full nine month course (which leads to a certification), we learned a number of things NOT to do. For example, many older accordions (generally made before about 1935) have brass keyboard rods. These should never be removed. The likely result of such removal is far more troublesome than whatever would lead one to try to remove the key rods.

While we were there we saw many accordions which were badly "botched" by home repairs, frequently adding to the problems of a good repair. We also saw many cases of cheap accordions in bad need of repair, but for which the cost of repair would greatly exceed the value of the accordion. That was frequently the case for some of the simple one-row diatonics, unless they had some redeeming features that might make them suitable for museums.

The museum holds a very extensive collection of accordion music and related technical reference material. Many of the items are very difficult or impossible to obtain. I was able to study some highly technical books written in East Germany which described a scientific study of the accordion. We have nothing remotely similar from our high tech country. I also studied a very detailed book on various tuning methods from the 18th to the 20th century. I learned, for example, that when Bach wrote the "Well Tempered Clavier," he did NOT mean the "Equal Tempered" scale that we commonly use today. There is a great deal of mis-information on this topic, including information appearing in current dictionaries.

Our teacher, Helmi Harrington, is a remarkable woman. She has had extensive training herself. She has three degrees in musicology, including the PhD. She was a concert pianist, but has always loved the accordion. She learned accordion repair at the Hohner factory in Germany, as did her mother before her. Helmi keeps up a schedule that would leave most of us in the dust. In addition to teaching accordion repair, doing accordion repair, keeping up the museum, she teaches about 90 students weekly. She also performs on piano and chromatic accordion and the concertina. She sleeps only a few hours a night. She spends Monday through Thursday at the museum in Duluth, then drives to her other studio near Minneapolis to teach and repair accordions there. Her mother lives in Texas, and she still teaches and repairs accordions there!

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
