fun. In spite of the rain, we had a good turnout for the workshop, and some of you even made it to our house for a little party for Sev Saturday evening (photos on pages 4 and 8).

A few days after Sev left, Stas Venglevski and John Simkus arrived and were also our houseguests. Again, we had a grand time. It seems so quiet around here with no houseguests! Stas and John gave a terrific concert twice in the Bay Area: once in Stockton and once here at our Moose Club in Daly City, sponsored by the M.A.P. program.

April Meeting: a Little of Everything

In the first half of the meeting we were treated to the longawaited program by **Sev Garcia**, who came all the way from Porterville for this meeting. First Sev played his light jazz arrangements of *C Jam Blues* (Duke Ellington), *After You've Gone* (Creamer-Layton), *Tea for Two* (Youman), *Tenderly* (Gross & Lawrence), Magnante arrangement of *Turkish March* (Mozart—which Magnante called "Mozart's Been Around"), *Perdido* (Juan Tizol) and *Sentimental Journey* (Brown, Green & Homer).

Then Sev turned to the old Big Band sounds, using his MIDI recorded orchestral sounds behind his playing. He played *String of Pearls* (De Lang & Gray), *In the Mood* (J. Garland), *Moonlight Serenade* (Miller & Parish), and for his encore, the beloved *American Patrol* (Meacham; Big Band arrangement by Glenn Miller), which included elements of *Columbia, the Gem of the Ocean* and *The Gal I Left Behind Me*.

Sev used very rich harmonies, varied dynamics and rhythms, fills and other surprises. Some of his renditions were very unusual and absolutely beautiful. As for the Mozart piece, Sev says Mozart definitely would have played accordion if accordions had been around in Mozart's day (Joe Smiell has said the same thing). Sev has amazing control of the bellows, with nice, smooth decays at the ends of phrases and pieces, with no "Whomps" at the end. He also had a very active left hand. What a treat! Let's hope Sev comes around often! (Continued)

After Sev came another great program by **Frank Mon**toro, who commented that the Hispanics are going to take over the club! First Frank played Rubinstein's *Romance*; then *Por Fin Toros*, a Paso Doble; a medley of *When I fall in Love, Let's Fall in Love* and *The Way You Look Tonight; Carte Postale* (a musette); *Woman Crazy for Me; Can't Help Lovin' That Man of Mine; Begin the Beguine* (Porter); and *Inspiration*, a tango.

Frank also spoke a little about the recent ACE concerts, naming the BAAC members who showed their support by attending the concerts (Frank Schlotter, Barbara and Dale Winter, Dennis Stoscher, Ernst and Lupita Angst, Michael Sanossian), and expressing the wish that more members would attend. (There were also some members who wanted to attend but were unable to.)

Frank also discussed some aspects of accordion playing that any accordionist should be aware of: use of bellow control for phrasing, dynamics and articulation, all of which Joe Smiell emphasizes whenever possible. Frank also described tone color and other variations that make music out of plain notes. The accordion, because of the bellows, is especially well suited for all these types of musical expression, and the bellow is the most underused part of the accordion. Dynamics refers to loud and soft, Articulation refers to the degree to which notes are separated or connected, Phrasing is the equivalent of a sentence in speaking. Add to the above Interpretation (i.e. tone color), and put them all together to make music. Frank demonstrated all of the above beautifully with his playing. We thank both Sev and Frank for their splendid presentations.

Val then announced the upcoming **Stas Venglevski** and John Simkus program on Saturday, April 19, right here at Moose, sponsored by the "M.A.P." program (Lou Soper). She also reminded everyone about Sev Garcia's very important workshop on Saturday, April 12, also here at Moose, on "How to Memorize."

Following intermission was the "Open Mic." segment of the meeting, which included Peter Di Bono playing Val's small red Giullietti and making it sound terrific with a French waltz and *Flight of the Angels*. Lou Soper then played several standards, including some vocals, using Frank Montoro's Colombo accordion. Jim Hillman joined in the party, playing André Paris' accordion, with *La Vie En Rose* and several others. Val played a couple of numbers on her little red Giullietti and managed to miss a chair that someone put under her and landed "thump!" on the floor, accordion and all—again an encore to the Christmas tree incident in December!



We are going to try to find out exactly what property (all kinds) that BAAC owns and write up an inventory. This is a difficult task that has been tried in the past and never successfully completed.


The Nominating Committee is working on finding candidates for President, Secretary and Treasurer as well as board members.



Sev Garcia's Workshop On How to Memorize, held on April 12 ...


... was a huge success, with 24 participants. The material was very well organized, presented by a projector and screen, and every point made was useful. Sev handed out questionnaires for feedback and sent the results to Val. It was almost 100% favorable. Did you ever try humming with your tongue (not necessarily singing) to help you find the correct phrasing (places to take a breath)? Did you ever try to practice a piece backwards-starting at the end and working toward the beginning, mastering each phrase, one at a time, in reverse order? Sev had hoped more people would bring their accordions for more hands-on work, but he was able to tailor the workshop to accommodate the lack of people willing to play. Why were there not more accordions at the workshop? Stage fright? The rainy weather? (Stay tuned for news of the next workshop)






Sev Garcia's Workshop: Frank Schlotter and Sev (Another photo on page 4)












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
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
THE MAN IN THE ACCORDION

In October 1950 San Franciscans were treated to the "unveiling" of one of the most unusual sights in architecture that it had ever been their pleasure to see and which they believe is one of the most unique buildings in the world. "The Accordion House," home of THEODORE SCHOOL OF MUSIC at 1666 Union St. The front of the top floor is built in the exact shape of an accordion with 120 basses and 43 treble keys. The keys are on the top of the house and they are regulation black and white. The accordion is black with chrome trim and red bellows. The registers on the treble side spell out the name "THEODORE" with SCHOOL OF MUSIC in large red letters below. The remarkable accuracy of this building was obtained by constructing the frame in wood in the general shape of an accordion, galvanized steel was shaped over it, then taken off and enameled, baked and porcelainized.

This gargantuan accordion was designed and supervised by Theodore whose large and beautiful studio is within the bellows of the instrument. On the same floor there are several other studios. Theodore's own apartment is on the



floor below the rear studios and to the rear of the store which is on the main floor front. Underneath the apartment is the garage and basement, making the building three stories in the

Theodore Pezzola and his charming wife and partner.

Theodore alter his decision to become a priest, so after his discharge from the army he returned to his studies in Genoa where he obtained his teachers degree but was prevented by poor health from continuing and receiving the law degree that had been his aim.

Theodore had relatives in America and so de-cided that he might be able to find a place for himself here. He arrived in America in October 1921, a period of depression for everyone and for an immigrant with little much more so knowledge of English. He traveled the road of all immigrants, adapting himself to new cus-toms and a new language, doing the most menial tasks for his livelihood until he became accustomed to our ways and learned our language. He made every obstacle a stepping stone toward his goal and spent every spare moment in the further study of music and composition and harmony. Living in the North Beach section or the "Little Italy" of San Francisco he heard quite a lot of accordion playing and became in-terested in learning to play it. As he mattered the fundamentals of the accordion he became more and more excited about the possibilities of this instrument. It was being used for dance music, both popular and folk dances such as polkas, mazurkas, schottisches, etc., a little one-piece orchestra for parties and picnics and camping trips, which was wonderful—but peo-ple didn't seem to realize that this was an instrument with a future, a glarious future. If the world could just be made to realize that this was not just a toy, it was a real instrument, capable of performing passages that no other one instrument could, capable of concert work and

Remember the "Mystery Player" behind Dinah Shore (page 8, April issue of The BAAC Page)?

The response came quickly from **Gordon Piatanesi**, who writes: "Ernie Felice playing accordion next to Dinah Shore. What I know of this fine accordionist: I believe he was originally from San Jose. Played in the Bay Area for years. In the 1940's, he purchased a new Colombo accordion from us, at that time we were manufacturing in San Francisco. The unit was made with two sets of reeds on treble, four sets on bass. Both treble sets were clarinet reeds with on/off switch for each set. He would use one set of reeds for a while, then turn off that set, turn on the other set and play those for a while. This way reeds would not be strained and would hold their tone longer....

"Reason for the cover, he was hired by Benny Goodman to play with the B.G. quintet. Ernie and B.G. would play duets, and by using clarinet reed on muted accordion, it would blend beautifully with B. G. Clarinet. Ernie moved to L.A. to be with B. G.

While in L.A. connections were made with a movie studio. Ernie was the studio's accordionist for years. At times you would see him with band, other times as soloist. But always in the background. Since Felice lived in Southern Calif., when the time arrived for a new accordion, he purchased a new Sonola from a distributor and service center in LA. Later on, Sonola came out with a Felice model.

"From what I heard, Ernie started having arthritic problems in hands and shoulders, so he quit playing in the late 70's. For a while he was back in the Bay Area in the insurance business. Last I heard, he left the Bay Area. A great loss of a terrific accordionist. Hope this is helpful to you.
