

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Stefan Hussong Concert

A very special event took place on Sunday evening, April 10. Stefan Hussong, easily one of the world's greatest accordionists, put on a solo show in San Jose's Le Petit Trianon Concert Hall, known for its classical chamber music concerts.

The hall was packed. A curious audience, many not at all familiar with the accordion in a classical context, were given a highly varied program, darting from baroque to tango to avant-garde. So few Americans have heard the accordion used this way that I'm sure many at the concert were shaken up, not only by Hussong's artistry but by the versatility and dynamic range of the accordion. Many ears were opened for the first time to the potential of the instrument.

The pre-concert talk was given by Roger Emanuels, a man steeped in musical education but who, until then, had never taken the accordion seriously. It's true that the lack of

classical virtuosos in the Bay Area has limited the public's access to such music. I mentioned to Hussong during his postconcert discussion that he should send over a few of his students to reside here (he's also a professor of accordion at a college in Wurzburg, Germany).

Though at first the program might have appeared a little schizo, it was carefully picked by Hussong to show the similarities within the differences. It was a

symmetrical arrangement before and after the intermission. Both the first and second half began with a soft, contemplative piece followed by a Bach chorale. Also included in each half was a tango-inspired piece, a highly exploratory, unconventional piece—and both halves concluded with a stately sonata from the 18th century.

Hussong while performing was very much at one with his instrument. Particularly in the wildly dissonant High Way for One by Adriana Hoelszky, there was a union of musician and instrument rarely witnessed on stage. Despite a double jet lag (Hussong flew from Germany to Japan to San Jose) and a sudden change in the program (a cellist, Julius Berger, was originally to perform as well), his handling of the diverse material rarely flagged.

Since the ancient ancestor of the accordion was the Japanese Sho (the same as the Chinese Sheng), a mouth organ with free reeds, Hussong began the program with a traditional sho piece from the 10th century. Its quiet tones emanated from the high reeds to give an authentic sound to this meditative, atmospheric music.

It was interesting to note that the most unusual material in the concert was written by women: Sofia Gubaidulina and Adriana Hoelszky. Gubaidulina's De Profundis in particular is a work of awesome scope and emotional power and

has achieved great status as a test piece in international accordion competitions. Many players have recorded it, but Hussong is the only one I've heard perform this difficult work on a piano keyboard accordion. Its use of breathing sounds, deep bending notes and

tremolo clusters have inspired a generation of composers writing for the instrument. Hoelszky's High Way for One was a distillation of a larger piece written for accordion and 19 instruments. Its harmonic density and impulsive energy were a wonder to behold.

Another highlight of the show was Fantango, written by Jukka Tiensuu in 1984. The title derives from "fantasy" and "tango" and aptly describes the craziest, most complex tangoderived piece I've ever heard. Other tangos in the program were written by Isaac Albeniz and Igor Stravinsky and served to illustrate how broad a range the form could encompass.

Though John Cage is often the whipping boy for some who dislike his worship of noise and chance, his Dream from 1948 was among the most euphonious pieces in the program, with its gentle, serene melodic line and open consonances. Other mellifluous works included Scarlatti's C Major Sonata and the familiar Jesu, Joy of Man's Desiring by J. S. Bach.

A 1967 Hohner Gola was his instrument of choice (he owns two Golas). It featured three rows of "free bass" notes alongside the traditional 6-row "Stradella" buttons, giving Hussong easy access to both systems without reliance on a SM switch.

A Further Note from Val . . .

Dick Schiller and I also attended the concert. I was struck by the fact that Hussong is a fairly young man, in his early 40's, and so will have many years to show the world what the accordion can do. In the post-concert informal Q&A session, Hussong demonstrated the very broad range and the layout of the basses; indicated that he prefers acoustic accordion and has no interest in any electronic sounds; described reedbending and how it works (best only on very low notes). I was gratified to see how many non-accordion people stayed around for the Q&A session and were totally fascinated.


