
## Musical Review by Jim Holliday

Dick Contino, performing at the Eighth Annual Festa Italiano on Fisherman's Wharf, was the <u>Main</u> <u>Event</u> for Bay Area Accordionists on September 30th..


A consummate, hard-driving showman, he totally mesmerized the large crowd with an electrifying performance on the accordion which featured dazzling keyboard work.

Accompanied by bass guitar, keyboards and drums, he played a beautifully diverse selection of numbers resulting in several standing ovations. One unique number was "Peg Of My Heart" performed entirely on left hand bass and chord buttons only, producing a sound similar to the great Harmonicats recording of that tune in the 50's. Several difficult selections were presented, but it was a virtuoso medley performance combining "Malagueña" and "Granada", and featuring a triple-bellows shake that completely stopped the show.

It was a great day for the accordion in San Francisco, and I heartily recommend all BAAC members make a special effort to attend next year's Festa Italiano!

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


If anyone can talk about the history of the accordion in San Francisco, you can bet Reno Pucci is one of the authorities on the subject. Get him started on the subject and Reno will throw more names at you in a few minutes that you'll wonder where you've been. You'll go away impressed with how much the instrument has meant to him as he takes you back through the years. "Accordions were made right here in San Francisco," he tells you.

Reno, a product of S.F.'s North Beach, started playing accordion when he was ten from the great master, Galla-Rini. Later, he went on to study with Henry Amaro and Caesar Pezzolo. He graduated from Balboa High and went on to get his B.A. from San Francisco State College majoring in Education. He decided that public education was not for him, preferring instead to devote his life to playing and teaching accordion. In 1963, he took over the Accordion Center from John Pezzolo, which was located on Mission and saw the decline of the accordion and sadly closed his Accordion Center in 1983. Scores of accordionists have to thank Reno for getting them started in music. Othmar Studler, Walter Traverso, Jim Cooper and Tom Serafini were former students of his, to mention a few.

His own career included playing in such places as the Carnelian Room and the Fior Reno still plays casu-D'Italia als specializing in "background music." No one plays Italian songs better than Reno, who takes pride in his culture through his music. And yes, he still teaches accordion in his Millbrae home. Does he ever plan to give it up? He looks at you with a smile and proclaims, never." by Frank Montoro
