The ACE Ensemble, under the direction of Joe Smiell, has come into its own and received accolades and donations, and plays regularly for schools as well as its regular concerts, both in the Bay Area and outside the Bay Area. The BAAC Fun Band has also grown from about 7 members to nearly 20 enthusiastic members under the musical direction of Sharon Walters and the administrative direction of Frank Schlotter, and now gets invited regularly for playing jobs in public. The BAAC Ensemble, with Joe Smiell as its director, has surprised many with its rate of improvement and is playing some pretty sophisticated music. (The BAAC Ensemble has been in hiatus during the summer but is now starting up again, and will be playing at the BAAC December meeting, as will the Fun Band

and the ACE Ensemble). The BAAC float was a big hit in the Italian Heritage Parade in San Francisco last October, organized by Ron Borelli, and is planning another major participation this year with our incoming president Peter Di Bono in charge.

Besides our club's playing groups, many BAAC members play regularly at retirement homes and schools. Among these are Jim Firpo, Lee Woodall, Tony Di Bono, Reno Di Bono, William Demichelis, Anne Métais and myself that I know of for sure, but there are many, many more of you out there. I'd like you to let me know where and when you play for schools, retirement homes and other public venues so that I can list you! If you have any photos, that's even better! More About Galla-Rini Camp 2003
BAAC Member Sundi O'Mara of Rocky River, Ohio,
well known to all who attend Galla-Rini camp and many
conventions and other accordion events, is a regular
contributor of articles for The BAAC Page. Following is
her contribution about Galla-Rini Camp

I arrived in San Diego on July 26, had dinner at the Edelweiss Restaurant with a few other campers, ate good German food and heard some accordion playing by Kjell Holmes. He let others play during a break, a fun time. Next day, from near and far, we arrived at the University of San Diego for the 14th annual Galla-Rini Accordion Camp. There were 40 campers in all.

During the next four days, morning classes were conducted by Maestro Galla-Rini plus some small group (parts) practice sessions. Afternoon classes were conducted by Father Joe Baccellieri, Joe Smiell, and John Simkus, taking turns. After 3 o'clock we had free time (if not having a private lesson with the Maestro or other teachers). In the evenings there was a jam session with Stella Allison (BAAC member from Maryland), and parties every night in someone's room—yes, including accordion playing.

There was accordion playing in the dining room during lunches and dinners, making the room come alive during mealtime. It was a blast.

Wednesday evening was the camp Dance Night, where we heard all kinds of music like German, Swiss and Scandinavian as well as oldies and standards. I played Slovenian music. This year we had a folk dance group performing for us (brought in by new camper Ted Hill). There was also a childhood photo contest (we had to guess or figure out who was pictured and cast a vote). There were some really cute photos in there.

Thursday night was the Camp Concert in Shiley Theater, a beautiful theater on the campus with a chandelier in the middle. The concert started with the Camp Ensemble (40 players) conducted by the great Anthony Galla-Rini himself. The selections were *Barcarolle* by Offenbach, *Coronation March* by Meyerbeer, *Romeo and Juliet Overture* by Tchaikovsky and selected themes from *Rhapsody in Blue* by Gerschwin.

After the orchestra performance, small groups, duets and solos played. I played *America the Beautiful*, a Galla-Rini arrangement.

During the concert, Mr. Galla-Rini was presented with a beautiful oil painting of himself conducting, with an accordion in the background, painted by Barbara Corsiglia (BAAC member), a very talented lady. What a great evening!

On the last morning there were goodbye hugs, kisses and checking out (sad).

I arrived home with a broken camera and loose screws in my accordion.

As with past camps, I'll be there next year. It will be my 14th year. There's nothing like live music!

Some Thoughts On Sharps And Flats (BASIC MUSIC 4.)



A primary function of the Circle Of Fifths is to serve as a roadmap, or guidance system for linking together sequences, or progressions of chords that are pleasing to the ear.

A secondary function of the Circle is that it places the various music keys to one side or the other of 'C' at distances directly related to the number of sharps or flats in that key. For example, the key of 'D' with two sharps is two stops to one side of 'C' and the key of 'D' with two sharps is five stops to the other side of 'C' and the key of 'Db' with distances on the accordion bass keyboard.

Once you understand this relationship, it is useful to have a method to identify which notes in a key, and in what order they have to be sharped or flatted. The Sharps/Flats Chart below gives this information. A simple way to remember it is to think of the three black keys and two black keys on the piano keyboard as a guide.

Whenever you are locating sharps or flats, always start from the three black keys. As each additional selection is made, you alternate back and forth between the two groups of black keys in a sequence which is shown in the Piano Keyboard illustration.


Your Executive Board met . . .



Tips for Accordion Health by Boaz Rubin

- HEAT can melt the wax that holds the accordion reeds into the reed blocks. Don't leave your accordion for long periods in a hot car, near a heat source or in direct sunlight!
- COLD creates condensation that rusts accordion reeds, ruins tunings and rots bellows. Don't store your accordion next to an outside wall. Never leave it in the trunk of a car overnight!
