


which I missed the name.

#### Special Memories of a Great Man Maestro Anthony Galla-Rini

When Anne Métais and I first heard of the Galla-Rini Accordion Camp at Silver Falls while visiting Gordon Piatanesi in 1992, we were floored—we didn't know such a camp existed. We were worried about whether we

were "good enough" to go to the camp and play with the group! Well, we took the dive, and I've never been happier with any decision I've ever made! I believe that was the third camp, but I have not missed any since then.

All the eager campers were assembled in the dining hall at Silver Falls when suddenly a hush came over the room. Everyone's head swiveled toward the door-and in walked the Maestro, with his proud bearing and overwhelming presence. There was deafening applause, while Anthony walked from table to table, greeting all his friends and graciously meeting new ones.

During that camp we were blown away by his beautiful playing, his kindly manner, his gregarious nature, his forgiving but still strict teaching and conducting manner. (He never did stop conducting-even while we visited him last summer—he just couldn't resist waving those arms when we played!)

At my second camp, 1993, on Performance Night, sitting directly in

front of the Maestro, I

tried my best to play the beautiful Reine de Musette. Needless to say I was scared to death as I muddled through the piece. Meanwhile, Anthony kept making funny gestures with his hands that puzzled me. Well, I was so "shook up" that I had forgotten to open the bottom of my bellows! Wow, was I embarrassed!!

On final camp days up in Silver Falls, when Tony would treat us to his playing of his arrangements of Ave Maria, The Lord's Praver, or the gorgeous Italian love song, Core N'Grato, there was not a dry eye in the house. The truth is, each of us was afraid this might be the last time we'd ever hear him play! But we were fortunate to get to hear him play many more times after that.

Over the following 14 years or so, we developed a special friendship, and I was honored that Tony remembered my name and my hometown anytime we met, whether in Texas at the TAA Accordion Convention, or Silver Falls, or Los Angeles or San Diego even after his 100th birthday. John and I visited Tony and Dolly a couple of times when they lived in a motor home in San Marcos. We would bring them wine and flowers, Tony would play some music for


us and then we'd take them out to dinner. Such great memories!

In 2003, I visited Tony and his beloved Dolly at the retirement home where they lived in Escondido. Dolly loved the button box (she used to play it) and asked me to play a few pieces. I was happy to oblige (luckily I had prepared for the possibility!). Both Tony and Dolly were beaming, and it made my day! Then: imagine howl felt when, hardly a week later, Tony himself telephoned me, telling me that Dolly had passed away, and thanking me for helping to make her final days happy. What a feeling and what a friend!

I was able to visit Tony two more times after that, when he lived in a home in Corona. One time I was alone and the other time was with Dick Schiller and Joanne Pilgrim (from San Diego-see photo, p. 8).





#### They Called Him "Tony"

That's what his students and close friends would call him, but to me and most others his name was "Maestro." I first met him in 1999 at my first Galla-Rini Accordion Camp at Mission San Luis in southern California, a beautiful setting that seemed to fit the mystique of this great man's orchestra. Whenever the Maestro would enter the room, whether it be for rehearsal or on concert night, there was electricity in the air for me. To think that I was in the presence of this great, great person, who had such a magnificent life bringing the concert accordion to the public. I remember my teacher, Reno Pucci, telling me years ago, that at a picnic in San Rafael in the 30's with thousands of people in attendance. the Maestro arrived in a limousine with a beautiful woman on each arm! A superstar of his day! At camp, wherever he went he was greeted with a standing ovation from us. his students, who wanted to honor him and show the respect we felt in our hearts for this great man. The pieces he arranged for each camp always included a very touching melody that would bring out the emotion in me, moving me to put my all into my playing as a part of an orchestra rising to its best in a tribute to the legend who was directing us.

I also had a private lesson with him, and boy was I nervous to go to his room, one on one! I chose the piece La Sorella, which he had arranged back in 1939. He knew exactly when he had arranged it, and told me a little story about it. I tried valiantly to perform it without error, but could have done a lot better. He was very gracious, and I found that I would rather talk with him about the accordion and his life than play. Imagine a private lesson and conversation with this great man!

As the years went by, the Maestro became more frail physically to the point that he couldn't conduct the camp anymore, although he kept arranging music for it. It wasn't the same though, somehow the magic was gone. And so, last year after the last Galla-Rini Camp in San Diego, Val Kieser, Joanne Pilgrim and I stopped by the "home" where



Dick Schiller, Val Kieser, Tony Galla-Rini, Joanne Pilgrim


he was living in Corona. We brought some wine and flowers and played our accordions for him. He came alive with our presence, talking and reminiscing...it was the "old Tony." Joanne Pilgrim, his student, played while he directed and made recommendations. Val played both the piano accordion and her button box and he loved it, a big smile on his face. I played the best piece that I knew, *The Lord Bless You and Keep You.* He paid me an honor, saying that I played with great feeling. I said that I wished I could have been his student. He replied that he would have taught me.


I felt sad to think that the Maestro was alone now, maybe like Guido Deiro at the end of his life, removed from the center of acclaim that once was his. I always meant to go back to visit him again, but never made it.

And now he is gone, the great icon, removed from our midst, my last link to the glory days of our beloved accordion. I'm so thankful that I was privileged to know him, his artistry, and his wit, if only for a short time, much too short. But I am a better person and player because of his touching my life. Thank you Maestro!
