

NOVEMBER EVENT SUMMARY

It was one of those memorable afternoons, with a presentation by Club member **Monica Ambalal** on the accordion culture in the Northern California Italian community and a terrific performance by new member **Duane Quenzel**.



Many of us know Monica as a Club member and talented accordionist, who just happens to also play a rare Excelsior accordion. At this club meeting we were treated to her academic side – formerly Professor and Department Chair of the music department and now Interim Dean of Allied Health and Public Safety (both at Merritt College in Oakland), cross-cultural and ethnomusicology researcher, and soon-to-be PhD (UC Santa Cruz). While working towards her PhD, Monica's research has taken her to numerous sources,

including public and universi-

ty libraries, oral histories, newspaper archives, extensive travel and more. Not surprisingly, Monica is an outstanding speaker. She gave us a glimpse of our local history - its past, present, and future - through a detailed presentation of the academic methods she utilized to bring this project to fruition. She presented a series of informative slides, some with embedded audio, which this summary can't possibly capture, outlining her research methods.

Monica's project involved 2 parts: historical documentation on the piano accordion in the San Francisco Bay Area and west coast since the 1880s, and contemporary field work through oral history, ethnographies and sound collections. She spoke to numerous individuals in the accordion community and visited West Coast field sites, stretching from Washington State to San Diego and, of course, Northern California. Numerous oral histories were obtained from individuals ranging from age 7 to 101. Local points of interest featured several North Beach buildings, including the Guido Deiro teaching studio (500 Columbus Ave), Colombo & Sons Accordion Factory (140 Columbus Ave, above what was the Purple Onion), and the Pezzolo studio on Union

dents; a base 1950's model Colombo cost \$700 USD, equivalent to over \$8000 today! There were numerous studios and over 80 accordion teachers in the SF Bay Area! Monica visited Castelfidardo, Italy, and met with Francesca Pigini at the Pigini accordion factory. High-end Castelfidardomade accordions are still handmade using century-old techniques. The presentation featured a short video of the factory. While accordion production peaked during the golden age, Castelfidardo still has a future; there were over 30 workers in the factory

when Monica (and her mom) visited. Monica fielded numerous questions from our Zoom attendees. Congratulations, Monica, and thank you for a terrific presentation!

Ken mentioned that the Club has in its possession a collection of Theodore Pezzolo's original handwritten sheet music, which was donated to the Club by Tom Torriglia.



New SFAC member, **Duane Quenzel** was made aware of the SFAC by member Pamela Tom. He studied accordion from 1954 to 1970, starting at age 3, and won his 1st competition at age 6! He started early by virtue of coming from a distinguished musical family. He has an older brother (6 years older) and a sister. His mother was a world-famous concert organist and pianist, who played all the major organs, including the John Wanamaker organ (1935-45), and previously played silent movie theaters. She wrote most of the music she performed in silent movie theaters, before Hollywood was born. She was the assistant organist at Wanamaker and was the organist of Constitutional Hall with the National Symphony orchestra (1959-1963). She had well over 300 organ and piano stu-

dents but did not wish to be the teacher to her own children. Therefore Duane's brother was introduced to the guitar and studied with the famed Andrés Segovia. Young Duane wound up being introduced to his mother's other favorite instrument, the accordion! He studied under Mrs. Jean Smallwood, who was the pedagogue for all Central and South America, Frank Moliterre (duet accordionist with Frank Marocco), and Myron Floren.

Duane studied and played throughout high school, at which time he volunteered to serve in the military. When he returned, there was no full-sized accordion waiting for him (see our November newsetter). He took a long sabbatical (50 years, in fact) but returned to the accordion after he retired in 2021. He visited Castelfidardo and was privileged to order and receive 2 Victoria accordions, a converter free bass and a Stradella. At our November meeting Duane played on his Victoria Piano Accordion Poeta V 5/5 with double cassottos. It's an exact duplicate of Frank Marocco's Poetta V.

Duane rounded out the afternoon with a terrific performance! He had played some songs for us by way of Zoom at our October Oktoberfest Accordion Circle in Piedmont, but his performance inadvertently occurred during the intermission and could not be appreciated by all. For November's meeting he graciously recreated that performance, which included the *German National Anthem*, seguing to themes from *Beethoven's 9th* and ending with the famous *Beethoven's 5th Symphony* theme – all beautifully played on his Victoria. Next, Duane played Mason Williams' *Classical Gas*, Tommy Emmanuel arrangement. Duane was terrific and by request played an encore, *Perfidia*. Finally, Duane wowed us with a virtuoso rendition of Abba's *Dancing Queen*! Thank you, thank you, Duane! We look forward to hearing more from you!

Mark Your Calendars! - January 26th, 2025 - Live From Chetcuti Community Center

We are delighted to announce that our first club meeting of 2025 will feature **Adrian Jost**, master of the accordion fellow traveler known as the bandoneón. It is a type of free reed instrument, specifically a concertina, that originated in Germany during the mid-19th century. It is characterized by its bellows-driven mechanism and button-based keyboard, distinguishing it from other similar instruments like the accordion. The bandoneón gained prominence in Argentina and Uruguay, becoming integral to the *tango* music genre.

Adrian Jost began his musical studies on accordion in Switzerland. At the age of 11, he began studying the Bayan with Fritz Tschannen and Stephane Chapuis. His formal collegiate studies were actually in the Sciences, in which he earned a B.S. degree.

In 1996, with a grant from the global electro-technology firm Landis & Gyr, Adrian pursued a Master's degree from Northwestern University, just outside of Chicago. It was here in the US Midwest that Adrian discovered tango and be-

gan applying his musical talents to learning the instrument that epitomizes the sound of this latin dance form - the *bandoneón*. In 2001, he co-founded *Trio Garufa*, a popular San Francisco based tango group that has enthralled audiences throughout the West Coast, Argentina, Colombia and Europe.

Adrian brings authentic emotional authority to tango music and is currently in collaboration with Argentinian pianist Pablo Estigarribia of Buenos Aires. Find out more by visiting: Adrian's Website, https://adrianjost.com/.



A Memory of the Neronde Accordion School Christmas Program

My sister Linda and I studied at the Neronde Accordion School, 3013 L St. in Sacramento with Mr. Joe Neronde. In 1951, six-year-old Linda participated in a Christmas recital program.

Christmas and holiday performances did not include all 90+ students from the Neronde studio. Our yearly performance was always at the California State Fair with all students and a variety of groups of different ages and numbers performing together. (More about these groups in a future SFAC newsletter!) The Neronde Christmas Show was a one-time recital for the newer students.

Holiday music was taught at all grade levels using mimeographed sheets so that students would learn a variety of seasonal tunes to perform with confidence and a sense of joy.

We were encouraged to perform at Christmas programs in churches, schools, ethnic organizations, local holiday celebrations, and at family gatherings for the holidays.

Linda practiced *Silent Night* all year. Our Mom helped her at home so she would play confidently and perfectly. On the day of her Christmas recital program, Linda played her solo number perfectly as the final performer closing the show. Afterward, Linda said, "The concert was really good." Linda did herself proud. However, after this program, Linda stopped playing the accordion. She was tired of practicing *Silent Night*. (Just think about the challenge a young student faces when having to memorize a great number of songs for a holiday concert, it means a great amount of practice and challenges to one's musical memory.)

Linda preferred dancing to playing the accordion. She later took dancing lessons and is a terrific dancer. When she decided to transfer to dancing lessons, we returned the accordion to Mr. Neronde.

ACCORDION REPAIR WORKSHOP



On a chilly Tuesday evening in November, a few Club members gathered around an old accordion to take it apart and put it back together again. Club member Anand Joseph explained moving parts and demonstrated the problems that occur when an instrument is stored the wrong way. Those pesky reeds don't take too kindly to such treatment! Anand also showed us how to unstick a bass button, install a new gasket, and repair torn bellows. It was a great learning experience for all of us to see the guts of this decades-old accordion that had seen better days and was in need of a little TLC. Anand learned accordion repair from Valdet Jakubovic and has refur-

bished many instruments. And he generously shared this

knowledge with us.



It is generally recommended that we not mess with an accordion, it is a delicate machine with many moving parts. In fact, there is technique involved in the very first step of simply removing the pins that hold everything together. Reassembly will go much better by following a few rules, but will quickly become a hot

mess if those rules are not respected.

Again, the workshop provided an understanding and emphasized limitations. We discussed the costs and benefits of a "reduce, reuse and recycle" approach vs. the convenience of buying a

new instrument that can provide years of enjoyment and won't smell bad or require expensive repairs. Anand also observed that restoring accordions took his time away from playing them.
