In Memory: Robert LeRoy Smith (October 30, 1930 - September 3, 2021)



It is with great sadness that we say farewell to fellow club member Bob Smith, who passed away at the age of 90, on September 3, 2021.

Due to health reasons, we haven't seen much of Bob these last few years, but in our days at the Oyster Point Yacht Club, Bob was a frequent performer at Club meetings and

a regular contributor to the Newsletter with articles on accordion technique and tuning. Bob is recognized by performers and teachers alike for his published book "Fingering for the Accordion."

Bob's professional life was as an electrical engineer and computer programmer, but his favorite pastime was all things accordion, which began when Bob started lessons at the age of 10. Bob was a dedicated member of the

San Francisco Accordion Club Band (aka the "Fun Band") and of the *San Francisco Accordion Chamber Ensemble* (ACE). With Bob's scientific background, it comes as no surprise that he did accordion repair work on the side.

Before his passing, Bob left the San Francisco Accordion Club with a priceless legacy that we can enjoy now and for years to come! Bob took it upon himself to scan and digitize every one of the Club's paper

newsletters from the very first issue into 2008. Bob presented this archive, captured on CD, as a gift to the Club. Thanks to Bob, you can now go to our website and follow the "de facto" history of the Club through our newsletters.







Bob will be missed, but will never be forgotten for his dedication and lasting contributions to the San Francisco Accordion Club. R.I.P.

Cotati Accordion Festival Attraction: Accordion Autopsy

George Bachich, the Accordion Autopsy booth master at the Cotati Accordion Festival has been sharing his knowledge about buying and repairing accordions for several years. George has 19 years of accordion repair experience. He started into repair work after seeking repairs for his own accordions. He received initial guidance on leathers, tuning reeds, and waxing them back into the reed block from Kimric Smythe (Smythe's Accordion). And he learned about unsticking a key and treble keyboards from Tempo Trend Music (Canadian vendor). Thereafter, George started reading everything he could find written about accordion repair, which was very little. He visited several accordion factories in Castelfidardo, Italy and carefully observed as workers assembled accordions, waxed and tuned reeds, built keyboards and bass machines, and made reeds and bellows. George bought old accordions and fixed some of them up for sale and in the process learned a lot by making mistakes and correcting them.

The Accordion Autopsy booth is located in front of the Jam Tent at Cotati. George gives a presentation on how accordions work, what commonly goes wrong with them, and what to look for before buying a used accordion. George says, "I think the most common questions are about what their old accordion might be worth and about whether they should buy a particular accordion they found at the festival."

George also says that "Accordion repair is not rocket science, and that with a bit of coaching from my website (accordionrevival.com) they can do much of it themselves. They should also know that reading [my book] 'Piano Accordion Owner's Manual and Buyer's Guide' [available on my website] before they purchase their next accordion could

save them a lot of money and grief."

One night at Cibo Rustico of Santa Rosa

It is not surprising, with all those great accordionists hanging around Cotati over the weekend during the annual Cotati Accordion Festival (CAF), that some of them would get together and jam somewhere on Saturday night. Usually the venue is the tiny backroom bar at Volpi's old speakeasy in Petaluma, but this year it transpired at Cibo Rustico Pizzeria in Santa Rosa. Why? The word had spread that **Steve Albini**, a long-time fixture in the wine country north of Marin County, would be playing there. A bunch of us from the San Francisco Accordion Club headed out!

After some opening tunes from Steve, jazz accordionist **Paul Betken** stepped up. Following Paul's great set, **Maestro Lou Jacklich** was drafted by acclaim to continue the show. His jazz solos from that night are still reverberating in my ears. Next up were virtuosos **Sergei Teleshev** and daughter **Maria**. When **Cory Pesaturo** arrived a little later, an impromptu quartet took shape featuring Cory, Steve, Sergei, and drummer **Bob Belanski**.

In addition to the SFAC people who managed to get to Cibo Rustico, the other diners were equally agog at the totally unexpected, virtually explosive mostly jazz tour de force that took place.

Within a day, Steve Albini had posted several photos and music from the night on his Facebook page. He wrote "What an amazing night we had at Cibo Rustico in Santa Rosa . . . Thank you to all the fantastic musicians who joined me. Bob Belanski, Paul Betken, Lou Jacklich, Sergei and Maria Teleshev and Cory Pesaturo."







ACCORDION PRINCESS, MARIA TELESHEVA, IN NORTHERN CALIFORNIA

The youngest headlining performer among accordion royalty at this year's 30th annual Cotati Accordion Festival was **Maria "Masha" Telesheva** (13-year old international chromatic accordion champion from Eugene, OR). Maria made her on-stage debut with her internationally renowned dad, **Sergei Teleshev** (chromatic accordion champion of numerous regional and international competitions). The charismatic father-daughter team were featured both days at Cotatifest. During Steve Albini's gig at Cibo Rustico Pizzeria in Santa Rosa, Sergei Teleshev and Maria delighted diners with their numbers.

Sergei and Maria's versatile repertoire spans classic to rock (from J.S. Bach to AC/DC). Their performances were full of musical surprises on stage and had great appeal to the Cotati audience as evidenced by the thunderous and long applause. Maria was six years old when she took up the accordion under her father's tutelage. Two months after Maria started playing, she won her first international competition. Since then, Cotati's accordion princess of 2021 has won several international competitions in the United States, Canada, Australia, Italy, and Belarus. Maria's musical abilities extend beyond her exceptional duet and solo accordion performances. She's also a talented singer in Russian and English! Maria's perfectly-on-pitch voice and singing style covers a wide range of genres to suit the occasion. Watch for Maria Telesheva... her star is rising!
