

Gail Campanella has performed for accordion clubs around the country, including San Francisco, Silicon Valley, Orange County, San Diego, Las Vegas, Phoenix, Chicago and Washington DC, as well as the 2013, 2017, and 2021 Cotati Festivals. She is a member of the Accordionists and Teachers Guild, Intl. and the Los Angeles Accordionaires Orchestra. Gail participates as bass player in Stas Venglevski's Houston Accordion Orchestra as well as bass and conductor in the Rose City Accordion Camp. She has also been guest artist with the Santa Barbara City College Jazz Band and the LA Symphonic Winds.

From the moment Gail uncovered the contents of an unusual black suitcase in the basement of her farmhouse, she was drawn to the accordion. She started lessons at the age of 10 on her mother's 1930's accordion. By age 14, she was teaching and taking lessons in Denver.

Gail majored in piano at Loretto Heights College while continuing her accordion studies with Robert Davine at the University of Denver. After graduation she taught music in the Denver



Currently, Gail's focus is to introduce the accordion to children in the Santa Barbara Elementary Schools. Students receive weekly instruction on loaned accordions, free of charge. She is hopeful that "Accordion in the Schools" will continue this September for the 6th year.

In addition to having private accordion students of all ages, Gail teaches beginning piano to young children in Santa Barbara's Yellow Bird Music Studio.




The SFAC shines at the Cotati Accordion Festival 2023

Armed with a 12- bass, Rosemary offered a couple of other youngsters a chance to press a few buttons, press keys and make some sound. If nothing else, it provided the parents a great photo-op and may have "planted a seed".

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
Loose Ends

- The 2023-24 Membership Drive will have begun by the time you read this. Although none of the Board members can even remember the last time dues increased, we have certainly noticed the increased cost of running the Club. The inflation's biggest impact has been on (a) the cost of printing & mailing newsletters to Club members who opt to receive it that way (more than \$2 per issue); and (b) the rental fee for our in-person events at Milbrae's Chetcuti Center, which is going to practically double compared with what it once was. The membership renewal form we just mailed details a realistic and we believe modest increase in Club dues.
- For the first time ever, our September meeting, which presents the great Gail Campanella, live at Chetcuti and all the way from Santa Barbara, will be **OPEN ACCESS**. You can share the ZOOM link you will receive with anyone you like, to increase awareness of our Club. This one-time-only arrangement is also our way of thanking you for your support as we begin the annual renewal drive.
- Confronted with this large rental fee increase for Chetcuti, the Board has begun discussion of possible changes in our frequency of in-person meetings, a possible change of venue, or both. If you happen to be aware of a venue in the Bay Area to consider, please let someone on the Board know about it. Remember, it would have to feature easy parking and be in an attractive, safe neighborhood.
- We receive relatively frequent requests from the public to suggest Club accordionists available to play at various events. Well, SFACers, who amongst you would like to throw your hat in the ring to have your contact information forwarded when these requests come in?

In Memory of Mr. Ken Chambers

We received a very short unsigned note that long-time SFAC member Mr. Ken Chambers had passed away. I was very saddened to hear that, although I had never met him, and wondered what I could learn about him from internet searching.

I learned that he was 75 years old and married at the time of his death. That Ben Creed, who played at Cotati in 2019, had taken lessons from him in the 1990s. Ben played for the Bay Area Accordion Club (BAAC), the former name of the SFAC, in June 1999. On that occasion he was followed on-stage by none other than his teacher, Mr. Chambers, whose "rare performances on his Giulietti free bass accordion were relished". I learned that two other students



of his, sisters Mari and Amierose Bonnici, also played at the Bay Area Accordion Club, in May 1999. That Ken said in a letter to a Club member that he would be appearing in *Cabaret* in summer 1996 at the Santa Rosa Jr. College Repertory Theater. He wrote: "Theater performance is fun and always rewarding as it brings the accordion sound to literally thousands of people." Ken was the featured player at the BAAC meeting of January 1996, and the program writeup said he "got up on the stage and quietly blew our accordion straps right off us; his encore was *Dizzy Fingers*". I have also had the pleasure of hearing Maestro Lou Jacklich play this piece. And finally, particularly salient as the SFAC redoubles its effort in several ways to get more young people going on the accordion, supporting scholarships where we can, I came across this letter written by Mr. Chambers in 1996 to the Editor of the BAAC:

Across the Editor's Desk......

January 13, 1996

Dear Fellow BAAC Members,

Thanks for asking at the last general January meeting to start a scholarship fund for accordion students to further their educational goals. Although it's been around thirty years since I began and completed my higher education in the CA State University system, and there was a Vietnam war alternative to make me take my studies very seriously, it still seems like only yesterday that my wife and I were struggling students. We lived at the generosity of our parents, the government, many kind and generous employers and several scholarship aid funds

that were available at that time, including an award from the No. Calif. Accordion Festival organization.

Having since achieved many of our personal and business goals, been blessed with the arrival of and participation in educating three of our four daughters through college and beyond, we acutely realize the necessity of any financial help that can be set up and administered fairly to deserving students of serious intent.

I think one criterion for receiving any financial aid from BAAC should be regular participation in performance for the club, attitudes and, of course, other scholastic qualification and achievement. I consider it my privilege to either begin or add to this scholarship fund in a form of pay-back for the many advantages offered me through my training, involvement and sharing because I began to play and love the accordion at a very young age. I think playing the accordion is a most important discipline for the development of all thought processes and motor reflex functions of living a more happy existence. And performing well certainly brings great joy to both performer and listener. And all will agree the world could use more Joy!

Honoring Lou Jacklich: Accordion Pioneer, Teacher and Artist

August was a banner and roller-coaster month for **Lou Jacklich**, West Coast electronic accordion pioneer in the late 1950s, teacher and performer for nearly eight decades...and still at it!

August 2023 started with a guest solo appearance at the Silicon Valley Accordion Society monthly meeting (generally first Sundays of the month) at Christ Episcopal Church in Los Gatos, CA. He delighted the audience with a technically elite program of his outstanding original virtuoso jazz standard and classic arrangements of *Sum*-

mertime, Misty, Bumble Boogie (Jack Fina's 1946 adaptation of Rimsky-Korsakov's Flight Of The Bumblebee), Holiday for Strings, Hungarian Rhapsody No. 2, and one of his signature pieces, A Tribute to George Gershwin.

Lou's Gershwin tribute piece features the theme of *Rhapsody in Blue*, accented with woven hits including *The Man I Love*, 'S Wonderful, Bess You is My Woman Now, An American in Paris, Summertime, Fascinating *Rhythm*, and *I Got Rhythm*. Known for creatively composing original tunes on the spot with notes suggested by audience members, Lou dazzled them with four notes made into a flirtatious melody using a wide range of advanced accordion skills.

A frequently invited guest artist at the Annual Student Scholarship Fundraiser Concert, the opening program for the annual Cotati Accordion Festival, this year Lou was sidelined by an illness, from which he is recovering well. The 2023 souvenir program for the Festival included a full page announcement of the SFAC's \$500 Student Scholarship in honor of Mr. Jacklich. On the Cotati main stage, before hundreds of attendees, Elaine Cooperstein (SFAC Board Member and one of Lou's students) announced the scholarship and paid tribute to her teacher; she also presented the scholarship to Nicholas Plasichuk.

Towards the end of August Lou Jacklich was surprised by some of his students with a group SKYPE chat to celebrate his 95th birthday. Students wished him well and shared favorite anecdotes of his drawn from countless experiences as a performer. A favorite story during the call included the gig he once played at a nudist colony (he refused to follow the norm, *When in Rome...*). Jane Tripi performed her jazz interpretation of *Happy Birthday*.


